

# FRED PENNELL WIELDS BROTHER

He is in New York and There is a Rumor that He Will Not Attend the Inquest in Buffalo.

## DENIES THAYER'S STORY.

Effort Made to Show that the Dead Lawyer Obtained the Money He Invested on Loans and that He Was Not a Defaulter.

BUFFALO, N. Y., April 8.—It was reported today that when first interested in the Arthur Pennell estate are called upon at an official inquiry to divulge information as to the dead lawyer's financial operations, an effort would be made to show that the money which he obtained from his friends and relatives was in the nature of legitimate loans. It will be asserted that funds amounting to \$200,000 were advanced to him without any security whatever.

"Perhaps the \$200,000 which Pennell owed to friends and relatives in the dead lawyer's name which they loaned to him," said Attorney Wallace Thayer today. "It is possible that he was not guilty of any criminal operations."

"Do you consider that he could borrow \$200,000 from friends and relatives without giving security far in excess in value of \$200,000?" Mr. Thayer was asked.

"No, it is not likely, and that is one reason why I believe Pennell was a defaulter," was the reply. "It is generally believed here now that F. Frederick Pennell, administrator of the Pennell estate, will not be here to testify at the Pennell inquest. The District Attorney has secured a subpoena for him, but it cannot be served for the reason that Pennell is out of town. His attorney, Thomas Penney, stated today that Pennell is supposed to be in New York, and that he had no idea when he would return."

His lawyer is evasive.

"Will he remain away in order that he may not be served with a subpoena?" Mr. Penney was asked.

"I do not know what his intentions are. When he gets ready to come back I suppose he will return to Buffalo."

"Did he go away to avoid being subpoenaed?"

"He did not know that the District Attorney wanted him. I do not think he knows yet. I have not been asked to produce him."

The statement has been made that Pennell shortly prior to his death wrote out a complete defense in which he stated that a woman had killed Burdick. In this statement, it is said, Pennell defended his own honor and made a severe attack upon Burdick.

It was to have been made to the newspapers on the day Pennell died. District Attorney Coatsworth says that he will make the statement upon the papers and administrator Pennell to produce that final statement at the inquest.

Mr. Penney was asked today if he knew of any such statement having been left by Pennell.

"I don't know," he said.

He said that he was willing to give the District Attorney any information in his power and that he might throw light on the Burdick case.

# HE DRANK 7,000 QUARTS OF RUM

Joseph Doyle Tells Magistrate Crane About the Remarkable Amount of Whiskey He Has Consumed in Twenty Years.

## AVERAGES A QUART A DAY.

Court Discharges the Record-Breaking Drinker with a Lecture, and He at Once Sprints in the Direction of the Bowery.

According to his own estimate, Joseph Doyle has consumed 7,000 quarts of whiskey in twenty years. He made this admission when arraigned before Magistrate Crane in Essex Market Court today, charged with intoxication. In response to a question Doyle said that in the course of years he had been drinking he had averaged a quart of whiskey a day.

"Let us see," said the Magistrate, "that would be about 263 quarts a year, or 7,000 quarts in twenty years. At an average of \$1 a quart, which is low, because you have probably drunk by the glass, you have spent \$7,000 at least in satisfying your appetite for intoxicating liquor."

"You say you are a poor man with a family. That \$7,000 would have come in pretty handy to your family. In addition to the money you have spent, think of the time you have lost, the hours and days you have wasted! To-day your health is shattered and you are generally in a bad way. When you go to work you think of drinking again, stop to consider that you can make your family happy with the money you can save if you refrain from whiskey and that your health will be better in addition."

Doyle promised to stop and think. After leaving the court-room he started toward the Bowery with all the speed he could muster.

## Girl Who Drowned Her Baby Is Found Guilty of Murder in the Second Degree.

Rose Quinn, who drowned her three-week-old baby in a pond in Central Park, was convicted of murder in the second degree in the Criminal Branch of the Supreme Court, before Justice Scott, today. The penalty is life imprisonment and she will be sentenced next Tuesday.

In a few moments she had collapsed and was crying hysterically. Lawyer Sachs, her counsel, tried his best to calm her, but could not. When she was told to stand up and answer questions put to her as to her pedigree, the girl had to be supported by her counsel and a court officer. The sight of the suffering of the girl was pathetic and the jurors all turned their faces away from the scene.

The girl was indicted for murder in the first degree, but the prosecution had no hope of securing a conviction on this charge. Lawyer Sachs requested a postponement of sentence in order to allow time for the preparation of papers moving for a new trial.

Justice Scott, in granting the request, said he had no discretion in indicating sentence and would have to give the girl the limit of the law.

She has been indicted with the girl's mother, but the girl was born in the lying-in hospital in Second avenue, and when the body was found a tag on the neck indicated it was hers. The guilty mother was traced by means of the tag.
