

HIS DOINGS TOLD IN 50,000 WORDS

President Swanstrom Makes a Little Report to Mayor of the Recent Happenings in the Borough of Brooklyn.

AND IT ONLY COVERS A YEAR.

Tammany's Shortcomings and Reform's Good Work Related at Such Length that Mr. Low May Have to Take Week Off to Read it.

A uniformed messenger staggered into Mayor Low's office to-day, deposited a tome of greater dimensions than the old-fashioned family Bible on Secretary Reynolds's table and fell fainting to the floor.

The volume was entitled "His Swanstrom Came; or, The Annual Report of the President of the Borough of Kings." It took 50,000 words to tell what has happened across the river since Brooklyn passed from under Tammany control.

Among the things that have happened to gladden all good citizens are the erection of 2,000 new square yards, as against 2,333 under a former administration.

Looking ahead, President Swanstrom sees the necessity for tearing down the present municipal building and erecting a new structure on the site, including the park adjoining it.

Mayor Low will probably ask for a week's vacation to read the report.

RAMMED SHIP IS SAFE IN DOCK.

Wrecking Tugs Tow Her and the Sunken Barge to Moorings on Brooklyn Shore and Discharging of Cargo Is Continued.

BODIES NOT RECOVERED.

Four Men Drowned on Barge May Be Still in the Submerged Hull, Which Will Be Raised and Searched at Once.

The Allegany, of the Hamburg-American line, which was rammed in the bay yesterday by the tramp steamer Joseph Merryleather, to-day is at Atlantic Basin and the cargo will be discharged as soon as possible.

The wrecking tug Minaron, got hold of the sunken barge and towed her into Atlantic dock. We expect to have the boat raised soon and will then search for the bodies of the men who are supposed to have been drowned.

Emil Boas, manager of the Hamburg-American line, said to-day that as yet he had received no official report from Capt. Haase, of the Allegany. Mr. Boas believes that most of the cargo has escaped injury.
