

MRS. FLANAGAN BRINGS SUIT.

Makes Hattie L. Franklin Defendant in Action to Recover Articles Specified as Left in Opera-House Flat.

OF A "GENTLEMAN DE LUXE."

They Include Wide Variety of Wearing Apparel, Sporting Goods and Personal Documents, but Trial Will Be Long Deferred.

The effort of William Livingston Flanagan's widow to compel Hattie L. Franklin to give up the articles of a lady's personal character in the flat in the Metropolitan Opera-house building furnished by her husband has taken the form of a suit for damages.

This means that in about a year and a half the case will come to trial, the "preferred" May causes" coming along six months or a year later.

Miss Flanagan is suing the estate for \$40,000 for services as nurse to Capt. Flanagan, who died at a roadhouse on the Fort Washington Road after a week at Coney Island.

The present suit is to recover specific articles of their value, a total of \$25,000, and accompanying the complaint is a schedule of items in the living room, small hall and ante-room, hall closet, bedroom, bureau and chiffonier drawers, the closet and store closet.

PROMOTIONS IN JEROME'S OFFICE.

The patrolman, Kaufman, of the Elizabeth street station, arrived. He got a rope and tied it around the dog's neck. Then he tied the rope to a post and drew his revolver. One shot ended the dog's troubles there and then.

THEATRE, THEN A DOSE OF ACID.

Pretty Seamstress Was Stopped in Her First Attempt at Suicide, but Made a Scene and Succeeded Later.

SHE WAS ONLY 19 YEARS OLD.

Bertha Lavin, a pretty Russian lass of nineteen, who was employed as a seamstress by Mme. Helen Evlanka, a dressmaker at No. 129 East One Hundred and First street, committed suicide in the basement to-day by taking carbolic acid.

The unfortunate girl created a scene when she was frustrated in her effort to destroy herself and said she would go away where she could commit suicide without interference.

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"LOU" BETTS IS ACQUITTED.

Jury Out Only Ten Minutes Considering the Evidence, When They Return Verdict of Not Guilty.

The jury in the Court of Special Sessions, before which "Lou" Betts has been on trial for several days on a charge of running a gambling dive in West Thirty-fourth street, brought in a verdict of acquittal to-day. The jury was out only ten minutes.

Lawyer James W. Ridgway, counsel for Betts, in summing up his case, maintained that Police Commissioner Greene's tenderfoot sleuths from the West had failed to establish their contention that Betts was in any way connected with the West Thirty-fourth street gambling-house.

Mr. Ridgway said that the testimony given by the Western sleuths was impeached by the alibi evidence given by Samuel Spencer Irwin to the effect that he had been in Indianapolis between Feb. 24 and March 2.

The fact that these "novice" admitted gamblers had been in Indianapolis, and that the game was a square one, was authoritatively stated in the District Attorney's office that before the trial it was offered to plead guilty if arrangements could be made for a simple fine. This offer was rejected by Mr. Jerome.

RAN MILE IN AUTO IN 1 MIN., 2 SECS.

Alexander Winton Beats the World's Record in a Gasoline Machine on the Glenview Track.

CLEVELAND, O., May 6.—Alexander Winton in a trial run with a gasoline automobile to-day covered a mile at the Glenview track in one minute and two seconds, or one-fourth of a second better than the world's record.

Winton will enter the 300-mile race for the Gordon-Bennett International Cup in Ireland July 2 next.
