

DIXEY FACES THE APPLAUSE MUSIC

Comedian's New Play at the Garrick Wins Approval for Its Complications and Breeziness, and He Makes a Hit.

OTHER PLAYERS ARE CLEVER

But the Curtain Raiser, "Over a Welsh Rabbit," is a Heavy and Indigestible First Course—Henry Norman Wins Success.

"Facing the Music," at the Garrick, wasn't half as unpleasant as it sounds. In fact, it was a theatrical occupation, diverging enough to cause a perspiring public to laugh at the same time that it nipped its brow.

The farce, which came from London and was written by James Henry Darnley, moves along the familiar lines of mistaken identity, but it moves nimbly and swiftly, and therefore has a breeziness which makes it an agreeable warm weather offering.

A confusion of two John Smiths—one an American horse owner, the other an English curate—and the respective Mrs. John Smiths, complicated with a frothy actress rescued from robbers by the racy Smith, leads to a terrible tangle.

On the dreadful night when footpads were abroad and beauty was in distress both Mrs. Smiths were out of town. The "Rev. Mrs. Smith" on her return got into the wrong flat and before she got out she and the other Mrs. Smith and their unhappy husbands narrowly escaped arrest by an almost human detective, who imagined first one and then another of them to be members of the lawless band of robbers who did a tidy bit of presaging for the Bijou lady.

One of several funny situations was where the unholy Smith, to explain the presence of the other Mrs. Smith's hat, bon and parasol in his house, presented them to his wife as "little surprises."

Henry E. Dixey, with the exception of being a bit too farcical at times, handled the American Mr. Smith with a light, clever touch. He was amusing in his droll despair, and after his adventures last night he was a living picture of "the cold, gray dawn of the morning after."

Though Katherine Grey acted the Dixey Mrs. Smith with simple good taste, she did not appear to be quite so at home on the Garrick stages as she was at the Academy of Music in "The Ninety and Nine." However, her performance was creditable, and the nervousness she evidently labored under will doubtless wear off when she becomes more accustomed to her new environment.

Grace Hever imparted unaffected charm to the other Mrs. Smith. Henry Norman was capital as the thick-skulled, self-esteeming and deadly deductive detective, and other clever characterizations were the Rev. John Smith of P. Newton Lindo and the housekeeper played by Adelia Becker.

"Clay M. Greene's" curtain-raiser, "Over a Welsh Rabbit," was dull and indigestible. It was served by the Dixey and Thomas Hickets in the guise of querulous old fogies, who grew more tiresome each moment.

WOMAN BUILDS OWN MONUMENT

Mrs. Cochran's Memorial Consists of Carved Celtic Cross, Most Elaborate of Its Kind Carved in This Country.

Mrs. William F. Cochran, sister of the late Warren B. Smith, has had an elaborate monument erected for herself in St. John's Cemetery, Yonkers. It was completed only a few days ago by Sculptor Patrick Dunn.

Dunn has been working on the monument for several years, and experts pronounce it the most elaborate monument of its kind in America. The entire affair was executed under the direction of Mrs. Cochran.

"I want something that will be handsome, yet in no way gaudy," said Mrs. Cochran when she first visited Dunn. Then she told him of several ideas for designs. She did not care what it would cost. Dunn finally drew up plans for a carved Celtic cross, surrounded by granite coping. Mrs. Cochran approved this design, and told the sculptor to

pend as much time as he chose in completing it.

In a corner of the plot of ground where the monument stands Mrs. Cochran's husband is buried. The pretty little lot will be used only for the Cochran family, of whom there are two members now living—Mrs. Cochran and her son, Alexander Smith Cochran, to whom Mr. Smith left \$4,000,000. Mr. Smith left Mrs. Cochran only \$100,000. She inherited \$12,000,000 from her husband.

Coney Island is preparing for grand illumination, Luna Park, which is equipped with electric lights enough to light a great city, will have a dark globe in the place. All the other places of amusement will be as bright as day.
