

WOMEN HURT BY SUBWAY BLAST

Premature Explosion in the Trench Opposite the Grand Central Depot To-Day Causes Injury to Several Persons.

PANIC IN THE BIG STATION.

Travellers Badly Shock Up by the Detonation—Horses Bolt in Fright and Great Excitement Reigns in the Vicinity.

The premature explosion of an improperly blanketed blast in the subway trench at Forty-second street and Vanderbilt avenue to-day injured several persons, shattered plate glass windows with rock and mud, and caused great excitement among the people in the Grand Central Station, across the street. The windows in F. W. Schoonmaker's drug store, No. 40 East Forty-second street, were demolished and a number of women customers fainted from fright. Some of them were hurt by the flying glass.

Mabel Reed, the pretty young cashier, whose desk is in the front of the store, and Miss Mary Lockwood, who is in charge of the post-office branch there, were both cut by the glass, as was also James Farley, a porter.

The windows in the accounting department of the Lincoln National Bank, overhead, were also broken, and Thomas L. Jacques, the managing clerk, was cut about the face and hands.

Mr. Jacques, whose father is the manager of the Murray Hill Hotel, was injured in the explosion in that place about two years ago.

A large clock in front of the drug store was demolished.

Two cab horses ran away and there was general excitement in the neighborhood.

Storekeepers and residents of the neighborhood complain that the contractors, Degnon, McLean & Co., have been extremely reckless of late and have failed to give warning of the blasts.

Miss Lockwood, the post-office clerk, says she has become so used to explosions that she always embraces in her prayers the petition, "Forbid us this day our daily blast."

TWO KILLED IN POWDER EXPLOSION.

Several Other Workmen Injured and One Missing While Buildings Are Damaged in Pennsylvania Town.

TAMAQUA, Pa., June 12.—There was an explosion of powder today at the drying-house of the H. A. Weilly Powder Company, situated three miles north of this town. Joseph Welsh and John Kahler, who were in the building at the time, were killed, their bodies being blown to bits.

Several other men were badly injured, and one is missing. Several houses in the vicinity were damaged. The cause of the explosion is not known.

JEALOUS FATHER SHOT HIS CHILD

Kilkpatrick, Who Wounded Little Son and Committed Suicide in Central Park, Brooded Over Wife's Love for Boy.

COUPLE OFTEN QUARRELLED.

The Mother Sits at the Side of the Cot Where Her Child Suffers in the Presbyterian Hospital, but is Assured He Will Recover.

Mrs. Thomas Kilkpatrick sat to-day at the bedside of her five-year-old boy Thomas, who was shot through the abdomen in Central Park yesterday by his father, who took his own life. Physicians of the Presbyterian Hospital could not persuade the mother to leave the cot until they assured her the child would recover.

According to the story that was learned from neighbors and friends of the woman to-day, the suicide and attempted murder was the result of the father's insane jealousy of the mother's love for the little boy.

The Kilkpatricks were married seven years ago. For two years hardly a harsh word passed between them. When little Tommy was born the father became enraged at the love and attention the mother devoted to him. As the boy grew up out of baby clothes Kilkpatrick's jealous rage became uncontrollable and he struck his young wife. She left him then, but he persuaded her to return and bitterly upbraided himself for his former actions.

Struck Her Again.

But it was not long before he again displayed his unnatural jealousy and attacked her again. In the course of the ensuing three years Mrs. Kilkpatrick was forced to leave him a dozen times, only to be persuaded to return by his fluent promises.

Last March she left him finally and could not be induced by his entreaties to return. She went to live with a friend, Mrs. Charles Hopkins, at No. 2 Franklin Terrace, an isolated row of houses opening on to Twenty-ninth street. There she earned her living for herself and little boy by dressmaking.

The yacht cruises about the West Indies during the winter and returned to New York last Monday. Immediately upon arriving in the city Kilkpatrick went to his wife's home. She was at work and he did not see her. He went again Tuesday and Wednesday with the same result. Yesterday, when he went to the house, he begged Mrs. Hopkins to allow him to take Tommy to the corner and buy him some candy. He pleaded so sincerely that Mrs. Hopkins consented. He brought the boy back and then said that he was going to take him to Central Park and ride the donkeys. The little fellow seemed delighted at the prospect and Mrs. Hopkins could not withhold her consent.

Shot His Little Son.

A few hours later it was learned that the mother had shot his son through the abdomen, the bullet passing through the body and out of the back, and then shooting himself in the head and killing himself to-day that she believed it was the man's intention all along to kill his wife, son and himself.

The boy, a bright eyed, golden-haired chap, was well-known in the neighborhood of Franklin Terrace, and hundreds called at the house to see him in the days of his illness. Even Big Bill Devery, whose famous pump is but a few blocks away, had sent a messenger to the house early in the day to inquire if he could do anything for the mother or child. The mother refuses to have anything to do with the burial of her husband.
