

GRAND DUCHESS QUITS HUSBAND

Bride of Grand Duke Wilhelm Ernest of Saxe-Weimar Runs Away from Him After Ten Weeks of Married Life.

BIG STIR OVER SCANDAL.

Courts of Germany and Holland Deeply Interested in the Affair and Efforts Made to Suppress Reports of It.

BERLIN, July 23.—Europe's latest royal scandal, which touches closely the thrones of Holland and Germany, has been precipitated by the flight from Weimar to Switzerland of the Grand Duchess Caroline, bride of the Grand Duke Wilhelm Ernest of Saxe-Weimar, after ten weeks of married life.

Berlin is intensely agitated over the flight of the Princess, and many rumors are in circulation over the unhappy ending of the honeymoon of a particularly interesting pair of royal lovers.

In official circles an attempt to take the edge off the scandal is being made by the allegation that the Grand Duchess left because she found the hostility of the court ladies intolerable.

The Grand Duchess Caroline was the prospective Queen Regent of Holland, for her husband is the intended Queen Wilhelmina if she dies childless.

Had Only Her Beauty. There may be something in the statement that the hostility of the court circles at Weimar is responsible for the flight of the Grand Duchess.

PRESIDENT GOES FOR 30-MILE RIDE

OYSTER BAY, July 23.—Shortly after 2 o'clock this morning President Roosevelt, accompanied by his son Theodore and his nephews, George and John Roosevelt, started from Sagamore Hill on a horseback ride across the island to Sayville to visit his uncle, Robert Roosevelt.

It was expected that Mrs. Roosevelt might accompany the President, but she was deterred from attempting the long ride, about thirty miles, by the very incipitous weather.

The party reached Sayville at 6:30 o'clock this morning. The President asked the way to Locust Lake, the home of Robert Roosevelt, and after receiving directions proceeded there.
