

**DOWN ASHORE ON ROCKAWAY POINT**

Schooner Ann August, Dismasted by Squall, Drifts Helpless During the Night and Crew Swims Ashore.

The bulk of the two-masted schooner Ann August, is pounding to pieces on the bar within 100 feet of the United States Life Saving Station at Rockaway Point, and the fact that her crew and owner are safe ashore is not due to the presence of the wreck in the vicinity of the station. For Uncle Sam closes up this portion of his establishment during the months of July and August.

The schooner was off Sandy Hook last night when she was struck by a squall. Before she was taken in both masts snapped off within three feet of the deck and went over the side. The bowsprit was carried away and the hull was left without a rag to steady her.

All night long Capt. Charles Mott, William C. Vedell and the owner, Joseph R. Langdon, of Patchogue, worked at the pumps trying to keep the

bulk afloat. Their signals of distress were unnoticed. From the way the wreck rolled in the trough of the sea toward daylight the exhausted men thought she would founder. Their small boat had been carried away and there was nothing to do but stick to the wreck and wait the unknown.

Shortly after 7 o'clock a big wave carried the waterlogged hull high on the Rockaway Point bar and she began to pound to pieces. As the mist lifted and the crew saw land so they jumped over the side and swam ashore, crawling on the beach exhausted.

"It is an outrage at the government does not keep the life-saving station at this point open during the summer," declared Capt. Mott. "There is no telling when fishermen will be caught in a squall just as we were and will not be so fortunate. I don't want to go through another such experience. We were lucky to save our lives."

**SUDDEN DEATH OF HAGUE PEACE MAN**

George Frederick W. Hollis Was Secretary of American Delegation and Recently Member of the International Court.

George Frederick W. Hollis, secretary of the American delegation to The Hague Peace Conference and more recently member of the International Court, died suddenly at 8 o'clock this morning at his home at Yonkers.

George Frederick W. Hollis was born at Zellenople, Pa., July 1, 1857; was graduated from Columbia College in 1878, and studied also at the University at Leipzig. He was a delegate-at-large to the New York Constitutional Convention in 1894, member of the Peace Conference at The Hague from the United States in 1898, and more recently member of the International Court. He was the author of a number of books, including a history of the Peace Conference at The Hague and numerous lectures and essays on political subjects.

**STILL PROBING RIVER MYSTERY**

Body with Rock-Weighted Satchel Tied About Neck Now Said to Be that of J. H. T. Crismond, of Virginia.

Relatives of J. H. T. Crismond, County Clerk of Fredericksburg, Va., who has been missing since July 7, will arrive here today to view the body of the man who was found on Tuesday in North River with a satchel containing a heavy stone fastened to his neck.

C. R. Dickinson, of Brooklyn, who formerly lived in Fredericksburg, saw the body at the Morgue and identified it as Crismond and wired the missing man's relatives.

Inspector McCluskey, after learning of the identification and something of the circumstances, under which Crismond left Fredericksburg, assigned two detectives to run down all the possible clues in the case. Coroner Scholer is still of the opinion that the man found in the river was murdered, although should it prove to be Crismond's body

there are circumstances which suggest suicide.

When Crismond disappeared from Fredericksburg he was traced by Sheriff T. H. Harris and Commonwealth's Attorney L. J. Graves as far as Washington, where trace of him was lost. They alleged he was short in his accounts \$500. Crismond's friends do not think a shortage of that amount would have led to his flight, as he left \$2,500 in bank and owned property worth \$15,000. When his desk was opened a deed was found conveying all his property to his wife for life and then to his two children. Before leaving Fredericksburg he drew \$450 out of bank and paid off a number of small obligations.

**NEW YORKER IS FOUND DEAD**

Jacob Valentine Expires Suddenly at Mount Pleasant, N. Y.

MOUNT PLEASANT, N. Y., July 23.—Jacob Valentine, a prominent New York man, who was spending his twenty-fourth season at the Crawford House, was found dead in bed today.

After brief funeral services, the body will be sent to New York, where an invalid wife and two married daughters will receive it.
