

MYSTERY OF THE BRIDGE. Police Vainly Seek to Discover Identity of Big Man Whose Body Was Found in Harlem River, and Who They Believe Was Murdered.

MANY MORGUE VISITORS TRY TO IDENTIFY THEM. Autopsy Does Not Bear Out Statement of the Negro Boy, Cotton, that He Was Drugged, but Police Place Implicit Confidence in Story.

The murder mystery of Willis avenue bridge is no nearer solution than it was the moment when the unclothed body of the victim was pulled out of the water of the Harlem on the Manhattan side at 11 o'clock Tuesday forenoon.

Capt. McNally and his men are battling with conditions unique among the puzzles of New York's crime annals. They have the body of a man of unusual proportions and striking appearance.

Two Held for Murder. The two are held for murder, but both deny the crime, and the police have been unable to find a single item of corroboration for Cotton's story.

Put Snuff in the Whiskey. Cotton says the drinking party sat on the spiles under the Willis avenue bridge at the water's edge, and that Wilson emptied a bottle of snuff into the whiskey for the white man to drink.

Autopsy Shows He Was Drugged. Dr. Otto H. Schulz, Coroner Brown's physician, performed an autopsy on the body at the Morgue this afternoon and declares that the man was drugged.

PALACE BLOWN UP BY BULGARIANS. Hostilities Are Inaugurated in Macedonia by the Destruction of a Governor's Home and Killing of Fifty Turks. SALONICA, Aug. 6.—A special messenger from Monastir reports that the Bulgarian insurgents have dynamited the Governor's palace in the town of Krasovatz, some five miles north of Monastir. Fifty Turks were killed. A detachment of Ottoman troops has burned the village of Dinovo, near Monastir.

PARKS IS GUILTY; MAKES A THREAT OF MORE STRIKES

Undaunted at Being Found Guilty of Assaulting Peter O'Neill, He Announces that He Will Call Out Men All Over the United States, if Necessary. TIMOTHY MCCARTHY, TRIED JOINTLY WITH HIM, ACQUITTED.

Sentence, Which May Be Fine or Imprisonment, or Both, Is Deferred for a Week and Parks, Meanwhile, Is Left at Liberty on His Old Bail—May Appeal Case.

After he himself had directed his counsel to stop calling witnesses and let the defense rest, Sam Parks, the iron-workers' walking delegate and thorn-in-the-side of the master builders, was promptly found guilty this afternoon of assaulting Peter O'Neill, of the Plasterers' Union.

PARKS THREATENS. "I will pull out every job in the United States before I am through. I am heartily in favor of arbitration in any form that is agreeable to the laboring class. We have an arbitration plan with the Iron League.

"If this is a case of barroom fight in which the defendant was aroused to a heat of passion by some antagonistic act by another party it is only human that the District-Attorney ask that the sentence be as light as possible under the rulings of this Court; but if, on the contrary, we can show that the case is one of premeditation, or one superinduced by differences of opinion in labor circles and that the complainant in this case was maliciously attacked, then it devolves on the District-Attorney to ask that sentence be the usual one in cases of his kind.

THE PENALTY. The crime for which Parks is adjudged guilty is assault in the third degree, for which the penalty is one year in the penitentiary or a fine of \$500, or both.

HOW THE WITNESSES FOR THE DEFENSE TESTIFIED. The trial was conducted before Justices Mayer, Olmsted and Holbrook. When Justice Mayer called Parks to the bar ex-City Magistrate Brann objected to the trial proceeding, stating that he had not been furnished with the minutes of the testimony of the witnesses for the prosecution, taken Tuesday.

Justice Mayer granted the District-Attorney's request and about fifteen persons left the courtroom. McCarthy said he had been an ironworker nine years and since last December had been a walking delegate. He said he had known Parks six years. "I was with him on July 17," McCarthy testified, "in Lynch's saloon. We reached there at 5:30 P. M., and had been there for more than two hours when we heard some scuffling in the bar-room. Parks started out and some one hit him and knocked him down. Lynch picked Parks up and he came back into the rear room, where Lawyer Brann was waiting for us. We left the saloon together."
