BATH, Me., Sept. 22.—A race against time is going on at the Bath Iron Works this week, where the men are rushing to complete the cruiser Cleveland.



MRS. WARD WEDS AFTER HER DIVORCE

Former Kentucky Belle Who Obtained Decree from Reginald Ward Becomes Wife of N. Gibbs Ingraham.

LONDON, Sept. 22.—Mrs. Edith Newcomb Ward, whose time ago divorced Reginald Henshaw Ward, better known in London and Continental society circles as Count Ward, was married at noon to-day to N. Gibbs Ingraham, grandson of Justice Ingraham, of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court in New York City.

This is but another incident in the life of Count Ward, whose history reads more like an extravagant work of fiction than fact.

When she was a girl she was a Kentucky belle, has a romantic flavor to it, but that the divorced husband is about to marry the Dowager Countess Howe, and thereby connect himself with one of the greatest houses in the British nobility, even surpasses romance.

80-FOOT FALL EASY FOR "TUMBLING GUS"

Ironworker, Fifty Years Old, Reports for Work To-Day After Doing the Trick Yesterday—"Keep Wits About You," His Advice.

Augustus Treubel, the ironworker who fell a distance of eighty feet late yesterday afternoon and suffered no more serious injuries than an abraded cheek and some slight cuts on his fingers, was one of the first men to report for work this morning at the new building under construction at No. 20 West Eighteenth street.

With a jaunty air he approached the foreman, nimbly mounted the ladder leading to the fifth floor, and when the whistle blew was in the very spot from where he fell yesterday.

"It wasn't much of a fall," he declared. "In fact I've had many worse. Why, when I lost my balance and realized that I was tumbling my only fear was that I might be jarred up a bit and have to lose a few days' work."

RIOT ON WEST SIDE IN WAR OF RACES. Fifty Negroes Batter Half a Dozen White Men in Revenge for an Assault on the Negro Hamilton.

Red feeling between negro and white dwellers in the block in West Fifty-fifth street between Tenth and Eleventh avenues led to a riot to-day in which half a dozen white men and half a dozen negroes were engaged.

There are four houses in the block occupied exclusively by negroes. The advent of negroes into the neighborhood aroused the resentment of the whites.

Several threats were made against the whites and the block was worked up to a state of warm excitement.
