

PETER ELLIOTT "CRANK NO. 4."

Three Other Lunatics Have Been Quietly Arrested at the White House Since President Roosevelt's Return.

ALL NOW IN INSANE ASYLUMS

Government Surgeon Says Elliott Is Suffering from Hallucination that He Is Being Attacked by Swedes.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 6.—The arrest of Peter Elliott, who enjoys the distinction of being the first armed "crank" to be apprehended in the White House, has brought out the startling fact that no less than four "cranks" have been quietly arrested at the White House since the President's return from Oyster Bay.

CHARGE AGAINST PRIEST DISMISSED

Judge Foster Releases Father D. P. O'Flynn, Who Was Arrested Because He Refused to Answer a Subpoena.

Judge Foster, in General Sessions today, dismissed the contempt of court proceedings brought by the District Attorney against Father D. P. O'Flynn, pastor of St. Joseph's R. C. Church, Waverley place and Sixth avenue, because of the latter's refusal to produce in court the records of the church.

Father O'Flynn was arrested last Friday on an attachment. He had been subpoenaed to bring to court the records of a marriage in the trial of a man accused of bigamy. He refused to come to court, and later was arrested.

In court to-day Father O'Flynn's counsel said no disrespect to the Court had been intended. Father O'Flynn, the attorney said, had been told over the phone by Assistant District Attorney Chadwick that his presence in court would not be required.
