

NONE BUT MARRIED JURORS ACCEPTED

Counsel for Rupert Hughes, Who Is Suing for a Divorce, Won't Have Bachelors Pass Upon His Client's Case.

PLAYWRIGHT AND AUTHOR.

Trial of Action Begun in Supreme Court Before Justice Clarke—Couple Married Ten Years and Have One Child.

The suit of Rupert Hughes, musical critic, playwright and author, for a divorce from his wife, Agnes Wheeler Hughes, was begun before Justice Clarke and a jury in the Supreme Court today.

Mrs. Hughes also has a countersuit against her husband for a separation. They were married in 1893 and have one child, six years old. Mrs. Hughes before her marriage was Miss Agnes Wheeler Healy, of Syracuse.

Suit for Separation.

About a year ago Mrs. Hughes brought suit for a separation on the ground of cruelty and abandonment. He denied the charges, but admitted in an affidavit that he had ordered her from home, saying that he was justified. Justice Hall ordered Hughes to pay his wife temporary alimony at the rate of \$10 a month. She alleged that he made from \$5,000 to \$12,000 a year from his writings, but he declared the figure would not exceed \$6,000.

W. L. Mathat appeared for the plaintiff and L. A. Spaulding for the defendant. Mrs. Hughes' mother, Mrs. Healy, sat beside her daughter. Mr. Mathat put the talesman through a searching examination, asking if they were married, if they had children or if they were opposed to an action for divorce. Talesmen who said they were not married were excused.

A Woman's Male Friend.

One of the questions asked the talesman by Mr. Spaulding was this: "Would you consider it harmful to a woman's character if she had a great many male friends who also were friends of her husband?"

The co-respondents named are James C. Beebe, one lawyer; William Herbert Reynolds, a naval lieutenant; Max Karger, a musician of Chicago; Capt. Henry B. Lemley, of the Regular Army; C. Campbell, Robert J. Grant, Arthur Conover and J. Marmaduke Robinson.

Received in Drawing-Room.

"I presume," said the witness, "Mrs. Hughes received him in the drawing-room. I never saw her alone with him, and I cannot remember how she was treated."


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STOCKS QUIET IN LONDON.

Americans React on New York Advances and Close Week. LONDON, Oct. 8.—Rates for money and discounts were easy in the market today. Business on the Stock Exchange was quiet, yesterday's improvement being barely maintained. Support was absent, owing to lack of support, but they hardened later on investment purchases. Home rails were firm on investment. Some rails opened dull and irregular and afterwards became steadier and inactive. They reacted after the receipt of Wall Street's opening news and closed weak. Southern Pacific touched 4 1/2. Steel common sold down to 10 and preferred to 9. Rio Tinto eased on profit taking, the interior dividend being fifty cents above expectations.
