

EAST SIDE "CADET" IS CAUGHT AGAIN

Adam Leviskey, Who Served Prison Term for Similar Offense, Arrested for Abducting Girl Sixteen Years Old.

PRISONER IN A BASEMENT.

Girl's Companion at Dance Where She Disappeared Suspected Him as: Did Clever Detective Work on Her Own Account.

Adam Leviskey, a married man, who served two years and a half as one of the notorious East Side Cadets, was held to-day for further examination in the Yorkville Court-morrow. He is now charged with a similar offense, except that the police say they have seldom encountered a case filled with more horrible details.

Julia Ungermeier, sixteen years old, of No. 103 Stanton street, is completely sane. For two weeks she was held a prisoner in a vile basement room, daily threatened with death by acid, and was finally rescued by the police breaking down the doors.

Saturday night two weeks ago, Julia attended a dance with her friend, Anna Unsersberg, of No. 643 East Twelfth street, and while there they met Adam Leviskey. Before the dance was over Anna missed Julia and was told that she had gone away with Leviskey.

When Julia did not return home next day her parents sought Anna, and she was surprised to hear that her companion had not reached home. She suspected Leviskey, and started out to search for him. She walked the streets of the east side day and night until yesterday, when she finally saw him.

Girl a Good Detective. She followed him to the house at No. 23 Second street, and when he had entered she knocked at the door. Leviskey opened it, and she asked for her friend Julia. Leviskey told her to go away and mind her own business, and slammed the door in her face. Anna, determined to find Julia, went to the house again last night and met Leviskey's wife, who closed the door in her face. Then the girl called Police-men Kennan and Delinger, of the Fifth street station, and when they went to

the house Leviskey said they could not enter. The officers had Leviskey's criminal record and took the responsibility of forcing an entrance. They knocked the door down, went through the house and found Julia Ungermeier in bed in a dark room in the basement. She was frightened until she was hysterical. She and Leviskey were taken to the Fifth street station and there the girl told a story of horrors seldom equaled even in that precinct where the traffic in young girls has brought many harrowing stories to light.

She said that from the dance Leviskey had dragged her to that basement room and had there made her his victim. Several times each day she said he held up a bottle of muriatic acid before her and threatened to kill her with it if she made any outcry, attempted to escape or refused to do as he commanded. She said he had been making arrangements to sell her to an immoral house at Youngstown, O., and that she was to have been shipped there to-day. The police found the bottle of acid.

Leviskey was sent to Sing Sing before for abducting young girls whom he met at east-side dances and shipping them to immoral houses at Youngstown. He and his wife and John and Louis Weisberg were arrested last February in connection with the death in their house at No. 123 East Third street of Anna Gershtinsky. The girl had gone to the house, drank a cup of cocoa and died in two hours.

They were released, however, when the coroner's physician reported that death had been from natural causes.

LOCOMOTIVE TIPPED OVER.

Traffic on Pennsylvania Road Held Up by Accident. (Special to The Evening World.) NEWARK, N. J., Oct. 14.—Traffic on the main line of the Pennsylvania has been held up in this city for several hours to-day by the tipping over of a Lehigh Valley locomotive at the end of the elevated track near Emmet street early to-day. Through trains going either way have been travelling over the Waverly and Passaic Railroad, which has enabled the railroad company to carry on business with little delay.

Trains between this city and Jersey City have been shuttling back and forth, so that commuters from Newark have met with but little inconvenience. This is the first time the Pennsylvania has been compelled to utilize the Waverly and Passaic branch for passenger traffic since it was built two years ago and it came in very handy to-day.

SPECTATORS CAN'T RECOVER. If Injured at Public Exhibition of Fireworks, Have No Redress. ALBANY, N. Y., Oct. 14.—A spectator at a public exhibition injured by a rocket exploded in the usual manner cannot recover damages from the party having charge of the exhibition. Justice Herlick has granted a non-suit in the action of Miss Mary F. Crowley, against the Rochester Fireworks Company for \$30.00 damages. The action came to a sudden end at the conclusion of the plaintiff's evidence, when the motion was made and granted.

NO CRIME IN DEATH OF SUSAN DAVIES

Captain Formosa Convinced Girl Was Intoxicated on Day of Accident—Has New Witness Who Bears Him Out.

DETECTIVES STILL WORK.

They Search for Brown, the Dead Girl's Fiance, Who Is Said to Live in Red Bank, N. J.—Coroner's Inquest Will Be Held To-Morrow.

Following out the instructions of Commissioner Greene, Police Captain Formosa, of Brooklyn, has placed three detectives on the case of Susan Davies, the young girl who died at the Bushwick Central Hospital after falling out of a window of a livery stable on Van Buren street.

Capt. Formosa said to-day: "From all the evidence my men have collected, I am of the opinion that no crime had been committed. But I shall still follow up the case. There is no doubt that the girl was intoxicated. From some new evidence just unearthed this is certain. Mark Owen, a watchman, a new witness, said that he saw the girl come out of a saloon on the corner of Ralph and Gates avenues. She fell, and then picked herself up, and was afterward taken by a cabman to the stable."

"While in the hospital she was in a perfectly conscious condition for a long time, and if she had been assaulted she would certainly have exposed the men responsible for her misfortune."

District-Attorney Clarke detailed an assistant to be present at the coroner's inquest to-morrow. The police now believe Brown, the girl's fiance, is a wealthy resident of Red Bank, N. J., but do not know whether he lives there under that name or not. This clue was given to the police by a young woman friend of Miss Davies, who says she has met Brown and that he lives at Red Bank. The police believe he can throw considerable light upon the mystery surrounding the girl's death. Another peculiar phase of the case is the engaging of a firm of lawyers by the family of the dead girl. When asked why the attorneys were engaged Alexander Davies replied that the lawyers were to see to it that the police did their utmost to unravel the mystery. An incident at the Davies home that

excited some comment, although having no direct bearing upon the death of the girl, was the appearance there of Mrs. Alexander Davies, who had been separated from her husband. It had been said in one of two papers that Davies was a single man and Mrs. Davies demanded that the statement be contradicted. The police have also discovered that the dead girl had another brother, William Davies, who lives at Red Bank. So far as is known he did not attend the funeral and has not been at the Davies home, No. 1649 Broadway, Brooklyn, since the death of his sister. It is thought he may know William Brown. The police will see him to-day if possible.

ROBBERY STORY DOUBTED.

Helen Frost, of No. 142 East Fifteenth street, reported at Police Headquarters to-day that she had been robbed of \$125 at Third avenue and East Fifteenth street late last night. She showed a black eye as evidence of an encounter with the robbers.

The young woman told several conflicting stories of the affair, the police say, and they are willing to discredit the idea that she was the victim of highwaymen.
