

MARKET IS STRONG AND PRICES HIGHER

Pennsylvania Shows an Advance of 1 3-8 and Wabash a Point, with a Marked Bullish Sentiment in the Street.

CASH SENT TO ST. LOUIS.

More Than Two Millions Sent to Help Stop Run on Banks, but It is Believed the Money Will Not Be Needed.

Prices were higher and the market strong at the close to-day. Pennsylvania was the feature, showing an advance of 1 3-8. There was a marked movement in the Gould stocks, Wabash gaining a point. The whole sentiment of the street was that the turning point had been reached and that from now on the bull element will be in full control.

The opening was strong and for more than an hour the movement was steadily upward. Then came the report that stock yards companies in Chicago were in trouble and that there were new complications in St. Louis. The report that \$2,100,000 had been sent through the Sub-Treasury to St. Louis caused some nervousness.

The announcement that the St. Louis trust companies had been examined and found in perfect condition relieved the anxiety both here and in London and London prices, which had been lower, advanced until active shares were above parity with New York.

The heavy shipments of currency to St. Louis during the last two days which aggregate more than \$2,000,000 and the Treasury caused some anxiety as to the bank statement. New York shipments to-day were \$2,100,000, Chicago \$650,000 and New Orleans \$200,000.

Several bankers of prominence, according to a news bureau, said in regard to the shipments to St. Louis that all this cash would be required to-morrow, that the money was really not needed and was sent for its moral effect alone.

As a result of the heavy shipments several lenders marked up rates for loans for all dates at 5 per cent. It is not believed that these rates can be maintained as it is generally accepted that money must work lower. This feeling, and the better news of the day, had their effect, and at 2 o'clock the market had advanced until in some instances stocks were selling at about the highest prices of the day.

Butler & Brother gave out buying orders in Missouri Pacific, Texas & Pacific and other Gould roads, and there were all strong. There is generally a better feeling toward the Gould roads and many who remember when "Mop" was selling at 127 predict now higher prices for it, as the earning are much better than then and the physical condition has been improved.

St. Paul was also stronger and sold close to the high points of the day. The excellent report for September of Atchafalpa helped that issue and was syntactically effective in causing strength in the other granular roads.

The steel issues were steady and showed some strength rather than for some time. There was not as much dealing in specialties as usual.

American Car & Foundry was weaker on the report of a loss of one of its cars. The report of a loss of one of its cars showed some weakness after the publication of its very poor report, but the common loss of 2 points and the preferred dropped to 71. The report would have caused a greater drop, but the stock is held by strong interests.

Copper held firm all day, and its belief that the trouble between the Anaconda and Hecla would be soon settled. The regular dividend in C. O. caused no comment and had no effect on the price of the stock as it was expected.

The total sales of stocks were 400,600 shares and of bonds \$3,417,000.

BIG CROWDS STORM BANKS ST. LOUIS

Greatest Crush Is at the Mercantile Trust Company and the Police Are Unable to Keep Order.

MANY WOMEN INJURED.

Their Dresses Torn and Hats Knocked Off—Panic Caused by Circulation of False Reports that the Banks Were in Difficulties.

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 28.—Long before 10 o'clock, the hour of opening, lines of depositors stretched away from the closed doors of the Mississippi Valley Trust Company, the Lincoln Trust Company, the Mercantile Trust Company and the Missouri Trust Company. Small crowds were assembled before the doors of some of the other savings institutions.

The greatest crush was before the doors of the Mercantile Trust Company, on Eighth and Locust streets. At 9 o'clock the doors were opened and the crowd surged in with a force that swept aside the lines of police and bank employees to preserve a regular order to the windows and the paying tellers of the time accounts. The policemen were unable to handle the crowds, and Festus J. Wade, President of the Mercantile Trust Company, mounted a chair and made a statement that unless the depositors formed in line they would all be ejected from the building. He explained that it was impossible to wait on them if they insisted on crowding in such a manner. This announcement had the desired effect and some semblance of order was restored.

When as many persons as could be accommodated at one time in the banking rooms had formed in two lines further admission was refused until the first comers had left by a separate entrance. Then others were admitted and forced to keep in line and leave as soon as they had transacted their business.

Soon the crowd around the Trust Company's building had increased to such an extent that the police were totally unable to control it, and the officers stationed at the doors were swept away from their stations almost as rapidly as they could regain them. Women, who constituted a large percentage of the crowd, were crushed in the jam, and in the struggle their dresses were torn and their hats knocked off.

The policemen in trying to handle the crowd pushed many of them into the gutter, and in several instances personal fights were averted only by the interposition of cooler persons.

When the doors of the Mercantile Trust Company were opened Locust street, east of the building, was packed, while the streets to the west and Eighth streets, both to the north and south, were comparatively clear. Half an hour later, however, both streets were crowded to a distance of several hundred feet and all efforts to keep them clear were practically abandoned, while the police directed their efforts chiefly toward maintaining some degree of order at the doors.

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THE "HEAT MARKET." Wheat opened rather slow to-day with a steady undertone, although disturbed somewhat by further declines at St. Louis, where financial conditions are unsettled. Corn opened dull and about steady, showing no change from yesterday's closing prices.


