

# CRANE SEVERELY SCORPED POLICE

## Magistrate Reprimands Detective Who Arrests Man Because He Refused to Give Him Key of a Club House.

# ACCUSES POLICE OF SEEKING "SHAKE DOWNS."

## Hopes New Head of Police Department Will Stop the Abuse—Too Many Arrests of "Suspicious Characters."

Magistrate Crane, in the Harlem Court, to-day went out of the way to put the entire Police Department of New York on the griddle, and referred to certain police officials as ripe subjects for dismissal. He even declared in positive terms that it was his belief that 99 per cent. of the "suspicious person" arrests were made with a view to a "shake-down" by the police.

The specific matter in hand was the arrest of Charles Dietta, of No. 47 East Sixty-eighth street. When Dietta came out of the house No. 208 West One Hundred and Thirty-third street yesterday he was arrested by men sent from the One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street station, which is in charge of Capt. McGlynn. The police had received information that a policy game was being conducted in that place.

As Dietta closed the door of the One Hundred and Thirty-third street house Detective Charles Becker pounced upon him and asked him for the key, as he wanted to go inside.

Dietta told him that the house was the home of the Irish Social Club and that he would see the detective somewhere else before he would do anything of the kind. Then Dietta was taken to the station and locked up.

Refers to Man "Higher Up." Although several of his friends called to bail him out, Sgt. O'Brien refused to allow him that privilege, and Dietta was kept in jail all night.

This is what the Magistrate said after getting at the facts of the case: "Becker, I am not directing my remarks at you personally, but at the men 'higher up.' I want this to reach them. Last Tuesday the people of this city expressed in no uncertain terms what they think of the Police Department and of the petty arrests made by its authority. It is just these arrests that have made all of you ridiculous."

"Instead of arresting men and women for selling crullers, loaves of bread, candy and other petty things, why don't you get some of the burglars and murderers who escape your exquisite vigilance? This is the reason the administration was defeated last Tuesday."

Police After "Shakedown." "I hope a new man will be placed at the head of the Police Department who will put a stop to these petty arrests. If the incoming administration will attend to this they may be returned to power for another year."

"This man was committed for no offense whatever, and you know it. Ninety per cent. of the persons arrested as 'suspicious characters' have been found to be arrested for no probable cause, believe, and am only sorry that cannot prove it, that the men arrested come into the hands of the police with a 'shake-down' in view."

"Now, don't you dare bring any man before me again on such a charge as this. As to the sergeant who refused him bail, he should be dismissed. He showed an ignorance of the law and incapacity for the performance of his duty that should be investigated. Dietta was allowed to go on his way and the Irish Social Club was undisturbed."

# POOL-ROOMS? NONE HERE, SAYS GREENE

## Inspector McClusky Also Says that No Gambling Houses Are Open, Although He Admits Existence of Handbooks.

"If there are any pool-rooms running in this town I do not know it," said Inspector McClusky, Chief of Detectives, to-day in reply to the assertion that District-Attorney Jerome had received reports which indicated that 200 pool-rooms and gambling-houses were operating.

"One of those stories right along," said the Inspector, "but there is nothing in them. Of course, there are lots of handbooks being made on the races, but we can't get at them. You cannot convict a hand-book maker."

"As to the gambling-houses, I want to say that this town is free from gambling as it ever was. Only a couple of weeks ago we raided Phil Daly's place and I do not believe there is a gambling-house running now. And, about the pool-rooms, I do not believe there is one running now."

"One of the reporters interviewing the Inspector volunteered to conduct him or his men then and there to three pool-rooms running wide open within six blocks of Police Headquarters."

"Well, I don't know anything about that," and the Inspector hurried back under the cover of his private office. Police Commissioner Greene said to-day that he did not think the pool-rooms were running wide open.

"I can hardly believe," said the Commissioner, "that any one in the District-Attorney's office would give out the names of any police officials against whom the District-Attorney or the Police Commissioner is supposed to be gathering evidence. Such a disclosure would be manifestly an attempt to defeat the ends of justice."

"I do not believe that the gambling-houses are being run wide open in the Tenderloin. Inspector McClusky has reported to me to that effect. As to the pool-rooms, the police are endeavoring to their utmost to gather evidence against them and close them up. They cannot do this without the co-operation of the Magistrates and the Justices of the Court of Special Sessions."

"As a long time ago, we have been arresting on an average twenty-five of these pool-rooms and handbooks every week. I do not believe that the victory of Tammany has anything to do with pool-rooms and their running wide open, for they

# BOILER BURSTS IN CROWD OF STUDENTS

## One Man Killed and Others Injured by Flying Pieces of Iron During Experiment at Ohio University.

COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 6.—While students of the Agricultural College at the Ohio State University were witnessing the harvesting of a field of corn for engine purposes by a machine operated by an old traction engine to-day the boiler blew up and pieces of iron tore through the crowd of students.

The force of the explosion was terrific and was felt through all the University buildings. The most intense excitement was caused, and the students came running in all directions from class-rooms and dormitories.

Charles Pepper, the engineer, was killed, his body being badly mangled, while John Delgarn, his assistant, was fatally injured.

Among others injured were: Vernon H. Davis, assistant professor in horticulture; Edgar Burt, of Bethel, O., a student; N. E. Shaw, a student; George Denny, a janitor; Mrs. F. L. Mayor Sherman; Haverley, a teamster, and H. B. Shephard, a spectator.

# ULTIMATUM TO TURKEY.

## Sultan's Delay Likely to Force Action by Russia and Austria.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 6.—In pleading the superiority of the new reform scheme for Macedonia, on the ground that Austria and Russia will send an ultimatum giving the Turkish Government a fixed term within which to accept the proposals, and that in the event of another refusal the two powers will take steps to compel Turkish action.
