

WESTERN MINER CAN HAVE HIS NEW EAR

District-Attorney Jerome Declares He Has No Intention of Interfering with Dr. Nelden's Grafting Operation.

District-Attorney Jerome has been brought into Dr. Nelden's \$5,000-ear-grafting office. Unless he guarantees that he will not prosecute Dr. Nelden under section 206 of the Penal Code, a certain Western mining operation will have to defer the pleasure of paying \$5,000 for a new ear.

The grafting operation scheduled for 10 o'clock this morning has been postponed, pending a conference between the District Attorney and Mr. De Mill, of the law firm of Turner, Rolston & Horan, Dr. Nelden's attorney.

Dr. Nelden said he had no idea of such a thing as legal interference until a stranger called at his office and reminded him that section 206 of the Penal Code makes it a crime to maim or mutilate any one with felonious intent. He doesn't think the law applies to the present instance, as he has no felonious intent, and interference has never been made with operations for skin and nose grafting.

He wants to be sure, however, in case Mr. Jerome disapproves of his ear-grafting, he will take the western mining man who has ordered a \$5,000 ear-grafting to Philadelphia, where a brother physician has tendered him the use of a private sanitarium for the operation.

Mr. Jerome said today that he had no idea of interfering with Dr. Nelden's ear-grafting operation.

QUAIL POISONER KILLS MANY BIRDS

Owners of Long Island Game Preserves Suffering by Spite Work Are Trying to Run Down Guilty One.

(Special to The Evening World.) BROOKHAVEN, L. I., Nov. 17.—Sportsmen's clubs, notably the Brookhaven Club, of this section, have been wrought up over the discovery that some person has been poisoning quail by wholesale on their preserves. The birds are being found dead in whole flocks about the fields and woods, there being no shot or snare marks on them, thereby indicating conclusively that they have been poisoned.

During recent years the practice of leasing large tracts of land by wealthy individuals and sportsmen's clubs has aroused the ire of certain people, who find themselves deprived of the free shooting privileges which formerly obtained on the preserves, which are guarded by special game wardens and watchmen, invariably results in arrest, and this fact, it is claimed, has prompted the dropping of what was known as the "quail poisoner."

The indignation of the club members is pronounced and no expense will be spared in bringing the guilty parties to justice. As many quail which die from the effect of the poison are eaten by foxes and hawks, the operations of the "poisoners" can be determined only by observing the decrease in the flocks.

Bertha Denker, two years old, was so badly bitten in front of her father's saloon in Secaucus, N. J., to-day by a great Dane that it is believed she will die.

The dog belonged to her father and until to-day had always been a playmate of the little ones in the neighborhood. Both were playing when the dog suddenly became angry. He got part of the child's head in his mouth and was chewing the flesh of her face when Denker heard the child's cries.

Denker grabbed a bear mallet and beat the dog until he let go of the baby. Then he killed the beast. Dr. Richard Schlemm, who centered the wounds, said it was a mystery that the dog's teeth had not pierced the child's brain. The baby will be sent to Pasteur Institute for treatment, as it is believed that the dog was suffering from rabies when he bit Bertha. She is not expected to undergo the treatment, and it will be several days before she can leave her room.

Gen. Isaac Khan Spent Three Months' Vacation at Home. Gen. Isaac Khan, Persian Minister to this country, arrived to-day on the steamer Kroonland. He had been home for a ninety days' vacation and on arrival here went direct to Washington to resume his official duties.

The Kroonland was in wireless communication either with other ships or the shore every day of her voyage. She spoke twelve other ships in all on the way across.

Other passengers were Col. B. F. Woodman, of New Orleans, and Newton Adams, of the Department of Commerce and Labor, who has been abroad on a special mission.

'LITTLE JUDGE' CELEBRATES.

Justice John Henry McCarthy Has Another Birthday.

Justice John Henry McCarthy, sitting in Part V. of the City Court, is receiving congratulations to-day on his fifty-fourth birthday. "The Little Judge" had graduated from Clavin's dry-goods house to the practice of law, served several terms in the Assembly and two in Congress, winning and losing against "Tim" Campbell, and one term as Municipal Justice in the Fifth District, when Gov. David B. Hill appointed him to a vacancy on the City Court bench in 1891.

He has been retained there for twelve years by the people, and when Gen. James R. O'Brien, speaking feelingly of his thirty-five years' friendship with

Justice McCarthy, concluded by nominating him for promotion to the Supreme Court bench, he was unanimously elected by the audience comprising forty-eight guests at Shanley's after a theatre party given by Mrs. John Henry McCarthy.
