

MISSING WOMEN KEEP POLICE BUSY

Mrs. Jennie Midley, a Pretty Fort Totten Bride, Disappears and Her Husband Is Disconsolate—Soldier Also Gone.

The police records to-day show the disappearance of four girls from their homes. Through the efforts of detectives and friends there have been following the strange disappearance of Sgt. Aljoe Willis from his post at Fort Totten, more than a month ago.

Mrs. Jennie Midley, the pretty bride of a clerk at the fort, is missing. She was married the day Willis was ordered a deserter, and her husband refuses to believe she has gone with the young officer.

Mrs. Medley was Miss Allen before her marriage, and upon the disappearance of Willis she was selected as assistant to his wife, who was postmistress of the post. In addition to the tangled condition of the affairs of the office for which Willis is said to be responsible, Mrs. Willis declares that almost \$2000 is missing with Mrs. Medley.

Roxbury Girl Goes Home. Pretty Lulu Gleason was glad to return to her home in Roxbury, Mass., 30-day, after a week in New York, whether she came to make her own way in the world. She was tired of school and study, and thought a girl of sixteen should be independent.

Lulu came directly to New York, and, after getting a position in a Sixth avenue department store, wrote her mother that she was safe and happy. She did not give any address, as she did not wish to return.

Mr. and Mrs. Gleason came to the city last week and put their case in the hands of the police. Yesterday the girl was found at the glove counter of one of the large stores. She was delighted to see her father and mother, and declared she had had quite enough of New York.

Edna Whalen Abducted. Edna Whalen, the fifteen-year-old girl who disappeared from her home, at No. 324 West Thirty-fourth street, was found last night, and Mrs. Whalen said that she was of good character and said the elopement story was false.

TWO SISTERS MISSING, POLICE SEND OUT ALARM.



The police of Brooklyn are searching for two sisters, Lizzie and Mary Latimer, aged sixteen and seventeen years respectively. Until Friday night they lived with their mother at No. 35 Duffield street. Nothing has been heard or seen of them since that time.

Mary did not come home Friday night. The following day she met her sister Lizzie at a laundry where both worked. With their weekly wages in their pockets both girls determined not to return home. Another sister, Hilma, also worked in the same laundry. Knowledge of the intentions of her sisters to run away from home she pleaded with them to return to their mother. For a time Lizzie wavered, but Mary's influence proved stronger enough to have the younger girl fall in with her plans.

The eldest Latimer girl, Mabel, married and twenty-two years old, left home four weeks ago because her mother conspired her for being lazy. Mrs. Latimer thinks the two younger girls may have joined the elder sister.

Mrs. Latimer thinks the girls are held prisoners by some man. Mary, she says, associated with a number of young men, one in particular, and the mother fears he is responsible for the girls' absence.

Showered His Leg to Judge. Sight of It Caused a Decrease in Damages. Joseph Michaels, who was awarded \$1,250 damages by a jury in Supreme Court Justice Dugro's Court from Joseph Stern & Co., the fat boilers in West Fourth street, for injuries received by slipping into an open trapdoor, came to the Tweed Courthouse to-day to show his leg to Justice Dugro in opposition to a motion of Stern's attorney to set the verdict aside as excessive.

After inspecting it Justice Dugro said that he would probably reduce the verdict by \$250.

RECORD BABY IS NICHOLAS HURTIK

Despite Doubts of Doctors, Nurse Vrabec Is Positive the Youngster Weighed Twenty-Seven Pounds on Arrival Here.

Many physicians believe that the nurse should have taken a second look at the scales before announcing that the newborn babe in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Hurtik, No. 513 East Seventy-third street, weighed twenty-seven pounds. If her eyes did not deceive her, Nicholas Hurtik is quite the largest baby on record.

The nurse is Miss Marie Vrabec, and she is certain there was no mistake. The doctor who was called at the same time did not respond, and she ushered the youngster into the world without help. The scales she used were not large enough and she borrowed a pair from a neighbor.

The doctors at the Sloane Maternity Hospital say the normal baby weighs twelve pounds, and they have never had one there to tip the scales at so much as fifteen pounds. They think sixteen pounds would be a liberal figure for the Hurtik baby.

These opinions are sustained by physicians at the Lying-In Hospital and the maternity division at Bellevue. However, the Hurtik baby is a bouncer and has a pair of lungs large enough, or lusty enough, for an infant of even greater avoirdupois than is claimed for him.

Mrs. Hurtik is so proud of her baby's record-breaking weight and dimensions that she and the nurse are unwilling to grant even a pound off of the little table this morning the baby was measured for an Evening World reporter and gave the startling dimensions of twenty-four inches in length, with a waist measure of seventeen inches.

When the baby was born he not only tipped the scales at twenty-seven pounds, but he broke the nurse's scales, which registered only twenty-four pounds.

Nicholas Hurtik, who is the wonder of the Hungarian settlement, is the thirteenth child of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Hurtik. The mother has had six other children, but no one of them has ever weighed over thirteen pounds. Hurtik is a paperhanger, and he and his wife have only been in this country a year.
