

ADDER SAFE IN PORT AND MOCCASIN NOT INJURED

One of the Submarine Torpedo Boats That Went Adrift in Big Gale Still Fast Aground, but Found in Good Trim.

CAPE HENRY, Va., Dec. 4.—The crew of the Currituck Life-Saving Station today succeeded in getting aboard the stranded Moccasin, the submarine torpedo-boat. It was a long night vigil for the life-savers, waiting for the heavy seas to subside sufficiently to give them a fighting chance at doing something for the disabled boat.

The Moccasin grounded four miles below the station. Raging seas and a terrible wind made impossible help from shore. The convoy Peoria, the Government tug, was kept busy trying to get the Adder a tow and at least save one of the two cigar-shaped naval weapons.

It was about 1.30 o'clock this morning when the life-savers boarded the Moccasin. She was found tight and, as far as could be ascertained, in good condition. The life-savers could not tell from the first examination just what the internal conditions were.

Later they boarded her again and found the vessel tight and in good condition. There was nobody aboard. The Moccasin is high and dry on Currituck Beach.

Admiral Harrington, commanding the Navy-Yard at Portsmouth, Va., reports the arrival of the Peoria with the Adder in tow. He adds that the Yankton and Vixen have come after the Moccasin in another attempt to rescue her.

KISSED BEFORE, WELL, WHY NOT?

Miss Margaret Sullivan Is Confident that Her Past Experiences Had Nothing to Do with Deputy Sheriff Cook.

Because Miss Margaret Sullivan, the young woman for kissing whom Deputy Sheriff Louis L. Cook, of Woodmere, L. I., begins a three months' term of imprisonment in the new Mineola Jail today, admits that she has been kissed before, popular opinion has swung around and there is talk of a movement to have the poorly country official freed.

Miss Sullivan is not disposed to deny herself. She thinks she is a very much outraged young woman and she can see no reason for mercy in the bare fact that she has been kissed before.

Miss Sullivan is twenty-eight years old and is a pretty brunette. She was a school teacher in Ireland before she came here as companion to Mrs. Clement Lloyd, of Woodmere. A year ago she left Mrs. Lloyd, and has since been a companion to Mrs. Newman Pettit, of Cedarhurst.

"It was on election night that it all happened," said Miss Sullivan today. "Helen Seymour and I rode our bicycles over to Baldwin in order to get the election returns. While on our way over, there we met Mr. Lloyd and had a couple of glasses of sherry wine with him."

"It was 11.30 o'clock when we started for home and, of course, at a time like that my bicycle had to go and break down."

Then Cook appeared.

"Helen went on to get help and while I sat by the roadside weeping along came Mr. Cook in a closed carriage. He asked me what was the matter and when I told him he offered to take me to Cedarhurst in the carriage. Of course I accepted the offer."

"Well, the minute we got in that carriage he began to snuggle up to me and to whisper little compliments in my ear. I tried to keep away from him, but mercy! he weighs 300 pounds and I couldn't push him to the other side of the seat at all."

"Well, finally he kissed me. Yes, he actually kissed me. He had his arm around me or he never could have done it. But what could I do with a man of his weight in such a position?"

She screamed, he fled.

"I screamed and he set me out of the carriage. Then he threw my bicycle out after me and drove away. And then for the first time I discovered that he had been driving around Baldwin all the time and was still eight miles from Cedarhurst."

Miss Sullivan walked the eight miles home and the next day had Cook arrested.

He is a six-footer and is a well-known fighter. A short time ago he shot two Italians with whom he got in a row. He has a wife and three children.

"I never said forty words to her," he said this morning in the Mineola jail. "She imagined it all. That man Lloyd had me arrested, and when I got out he hit me all right."


