Mystery of Dorothy L. Magnus's Disappearance Solved by a Letter Saying that She Had Gone to Manila.

**FOUND SWEETHEART DYING.**

Starting Home She Fell in Love with Homeward Bound Soldier and Became His Bride When Vessel Reached San Francisco.

The mystery of the disappearance last April of Miss Dorothy L. Magnus from the home of her father, Conrad Magnus, a wealthy resident of No. 506 Washington street, Hoboken, has been cleared by the young lady herself in a letter to her parents.

Two years ago Miss Magnus wished to marry Paul Unger, a next-door neighbor, but her relatives objected because of the difference in religion. Unger then went to the Philippines and became an inspector in the Custom-House. Less than a year ago the young lady's grandfather died and left her a large sum of money in her own name.

She disappeared April 9 last, and since then nothing was heard of her until today her parents received a letter from her from Cleveland, O. In this letter she said she had gone to Manila, where she found Unger was dying from consumption.

Refusing to marry him for that reason, she took passage on the transport Thomas, bound for this country, and on board she met Stephan Talkes, a non-commissioned officer, who was on his way to Cleveland, O., where his wealthy parents lived.

The Thomas landed at San Francisco on July 11, and in a few days Miss Magnus and Talkes were married. Then they went to Cleveland, where the young man's father welcomed the bride and started his son in the dry-goods business.

Forgiveness and blessings were telegraphed by Mr. Magnus a few minutes after the receipt of the letter.






