

### TO TEST SANITY OF MILLIONAIRE MOORE

#### Wife Who Divorced Him Obtains Order from Supreme Court for Committee to Investigate His Mental Condition.

A committee appointed in the Supreme Court will determine the mental condition of Henry L. Moore, whose divorced wife says he is insane and is ruled by Mrs. Anna Deegan, upon whom he has lavished most of the fortune left to him by his father.

Mr. Moore was a millionaire, and his name first became publicly mentioned in connection with Mrs. Deegan when her husband broke into his apartments in West Forty-eighth street and assaulted him. Deegan, a poor teacher, was sentenced to serve a term in prison.

Mrs. Moore was granted a divorce in 1898, with \$4,000 a year alimony. Their home was in Philadelphia, but after the separation Moore had been in New York. The alimony had not been paid, she says, although he received a great fortune at the death of his father, Andrew H. Moore, and an annuity of \$15,000.

Since he met Mrs. Deegan, Mrs. Moore declares her former husband has squandered all his money on her until he admitted, when she obtained a judgment for alimony, that he had disposed of most of his property and had mortgaged his income.

Mrs. Moore charges that a large part of this money has been turned over to Mrs. Deegan, who lives luxuriously, rides in carriages and wears costly jewels. Mrs. Moore's circumstances are greatly reduced, she says, and she sometimes waits for the bare necessities.

The one daughter of the couple, Miss Lelia Moore, bears out her mother's statement and in an affidavit to New York court she says she has seen the peculiarities of her father and the spell the Deegan woman has cast over him.

Mr. William Jacobson says he has attended Moore frequently and has found that he has hallucinations. Mrs. Deegan, he says, has him completely at her mercy and obeys her like a dog. Occasionally they quarrel, Dr. Jacobson says, and when the woman threatens to leave him he drops on his knees and implores her to remain.

Mrs. Deegan's rise from almost poverty to riches was a marvel to her former neighbors on the lower west side. Her husband was a teamster, but after their separation he worked little and went to live at a Raines law hotel in Eighth avenue.

Every week his wife would drive to the place in a handsome carriage and bought drinks for the men who hung about the saloon. He seemed satisfied that his wife should wear expensive gowns and more expensive jewelry. Mrs. Deegan is a brunette of striking appearance. Although not married, she is very graceful and beauty charmed the wealthy man.

#### New York Man Hunting in Maine Pursued by Animal Which Follows Him to Creek and Is Drowned.

PORTAGE, Me., Dec. 10.—H. D. Chase, of New York, returned from a hunting excursion to-day with a story of a narrow escape from a large bull moose after his rifle had refused to work. He was tired and worn from his experience.


