

ROBBED KILLED FIGHTING POLICE

Shot in Running Pistol Battle, in Which Five Safe-Breakers Tried to Hold Off Two Bluecoats.

BOSTON, Dec. 17.—In a running fight between five burglars, who had broken into an office in East Boston, and two policemen early to-day one of the burglars was shot dead.

The identity of the dead burglar is not known. Although all five of the hunted men used their revolvers freely on the pursuing police, neither of the latter was hit.

The burglars had previously broken into the office of the Metropolitan Coal Company, in East Boston, and brutally beaten the watchman, blown open the safe and escaped with \$200.

Faced Their Pistols. The policemen who chased the robbers were Sgt. Aubons and Patrolman Hankard. Shortly after 1 o'clock John Donovan, the watchman employed at the coal company's office, was awakened by the noise of an explosion.

He hurried down the rear stairway and found three men, each pointing a revolver at him. An unexpected blow knocked him down. A fourth had been lammed over the head and the burglars jumped on his body until he was unconscious.

The robbers then removed the contents of the safe, which they had previously blown open with dynamite, and escaped over the bridge between East Boston and Winthrop.

Shortly afterward Donovan regained consciousness and crawling to the desk, telephoned an alarm. The police responded, and in the absence of a promising clue began a search in the vicinity.

About two hours after the alarm was given Sgt. Aubons and Patrolman Hankard started a search in the district skirting the tracks of the Boston, Revere Beach and Lynn Railroad, when five men appeared, a growth of tall weeds and began shooting with revolvers.

The officers returned the fire. The burglars ran down the railroad tracks. Untouched by any of the bullets, Aubons and Hankard followed, but the robbers had such a lead that the police were outdistanced.

The officers retraced their steps, when they stumbled across a body. It was that of a man about thirty years of age. In his right hand was clutched a revolver. There was a bullet hole in his forehead and another in the back of the head. Later the body was identified by Watchman Donovan as that of one of the burglars.

The dead man was clad in old, almost ragged clothing. The only distinguishing mark found about him was on the lining of his hat, where was written in pencil "W. L. Douglas." The hat had been purchased in New York.

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PRETTY GIRL HELD AS A SWINDLER

Accused of Posing as the Daughter of Laura Biggar, the Actress, in Order to Purchase Goods on Credit.

The most beautiful young woman ever seen in Jefferson Market Court, according to the beauty experts who have been on duty there for several years, was Miss Florence Pilgrim, twenty-two years old, who was charged by a department store detective with having obtained goods under false pretenses.

According to the statement of the detective, Harry Blades, Miss Pilgrim had passed herself off at times as the daughter of Laura Biggar, the actress, and at other times as the daughter of Dr. P. F. Malcom.

She purchased feather boas, silk waists and other costly finery and ordered the bills sent to either the actress or the physician. Blades also said that at other times she returned goods she had purchased on credit and insisted that she had paid cash for them and got the money returned from the cashier.

Miss Pilgrim was dressed in a snug-fitting tailor-made dress when she appeared in court and wore costly furs. During the hour or more she had to wait before her case was reached she sat among the bedraggled regulars of the court and questioned them as to how they came there. Only once during her examination did she show any emotion, and that was when she referred to her mother and said she would be heartbroken if she learned of her daughter's arrest.

Miss Pilgrim was represented in court by Lawyer Thomas Moran. Magistrate Cornell held her in \$1,000 bail. She is now in the Tombs awaiting a bondsman. The address she gave in court, it is said, was found to be fictitious. The name is also believed to be fictitious.

IMPORTER FOUND DEAD. Amansel Stone Dies of Accidental Asphyxiation.

Amansel Stone, an importer of cocoanuts, was found dead to-day in his room at No. 61 West Eleventh street. Mrs. Louisa Madison, who rented him the room three weeks ago, smelled gas and opened the door. Stone was dead. The cork attached to a gas stove was turned off, but the cork connecting the rubber tube with a wall jet was open. The pipe leaked and the gas filled the room. It is believed the death was accidental.

CITY MOURNS THE BISHOP. All Business Suspended During Funeral of New Hampshire Prelate.

MANCHESTER, N. H., Dec. 17.—With the entire city in mourning, her extensive manufacturing and trade interests suspended, and the representative citizens assembled to honor the memory of the dead, the funeral of Right Rev. Denis M. Bradley, D. D., Roman Catholic Bishop of the Diocese of New Hampshire, was held from St. Joseph's Cathedral to-day.

In the vast congregation which filled the church were representatives of the State and city governments, prominent business men and members of Protestant churches.

A pontifical high mass of requiem was sung, the celebrant being Bishop Thomas Heaven, of Springfield. The musical part of the mass was sung by a choir composed of the priests of the diocese. The eulogy was delivered by the Right Rev. Matthew Harkins, D. D., Bishop of Providence. Five absolutions followed, by five New England bishops, the last by the Archbishop.
