MERCHANTS ARE AROUSED TO WORK FOR CONVENTION

John D. Crimmins Reports, After an Informal Conference with Business Men, that Great Progress Has Been Made and the Outlook Is Most Encouraging for New York.

MR. FORNES CALLS FOR MEETING OF PUBLIC SPIRITED CITIZENS.

President of the Board of Aldermen Asks Them to Assemble at the City Hall To-Morrow Afternoon—Congressman Sullivan Adds a Contribution of \$1,000 to Fund.

A CALL TO NEW YORK BUSINESS MEN

New York, Jan. 29, 1903. To the Editor of The Evening World. Dear Sir—I have been asked to call a meeting of all the citizens of New York who are interested in getting the National Democratic Convention to New York in June, 1904.

I want to impress upon the people of New York that this is not a political movement in any sense. It is a movement to bring 500,000 representative Americans to our city. Such a gathering cannot but be of lasting benefit to New York.

This meeting to be held to-morrow will be open to all men who are interested in the welfare of New York. I hope that every class of professional and business men will be represented.

The meeting will be held at 2 P. M. Wednesday. If you are interested in the welfare of New York attend this meeting.

Mr. John D. Crimmins said this afternoon after an informal conference with some of the leading business men of New York, who were called together to push the movement to get the Democratic National Convention in New York in June next:

"I can report excellent progress. I have endeavored to interest the leading citizens of New York and have so far succeeded excellently. At the meeting of citizens to be held in the ante-room of the Aldermanic Chamber at 2 o'clock to-morrow I shall report what I have done and shall report that progress has been made by me in my efforts."

MR. SULLIVAN'S SUBSCRIPTION. Immediately following the call for a public meeting, to be held in the ante-room of the Aldermanic chamber to-morrow, comes the announcement from Congressman Timothy D. Sullivan that he will pledge himself to give \$1,000 to bring the Democratic National Convention to New York next June.

At a meeting to be held to-morrow ways and means for raising the funds to insure the convention in New York will be devised. It is known that the movement to get the convention to New York has the support of the department store men of New York, the Hotel Men's Association of New York, the railroads, business and professional men, theatrical managers, showmen and business men in Coney Island, and in fact every class of men who take a civic pride in New York.

All that is needed now for New York to make its bid for the convention is a fund. When the National Committee meet in Washington on Jan. 12, John D. Crimmins, who with Jacob A. Cantor is acting with Mr. Fornes, will go to Washington and present New York's claims to the committee.


ALDERMEN AID THE WORK. Among the members of the Board of Aldermen who have signified their willingness to act with the Convention Committee are Frank Dowling, John T. McCall and Timothy P. Sullivan. It is said that there is not a member of the Board of Aldermen who is opposed to the convention, be he Democrat or Republican. In fact, the Aldermen are a unit for the convention, all of them believing that it will be of untold good to New York.

Brooklyn will be represented at to-morrow's meeting by Senator McCarran, who has declared that the convention will strengthen New York's chances for success to elect a President in 1904, and also be of great commercial benefit to the city and State.

The determination of leading Democrats and business men to bring the Convention if possible is shown by the announcement that bringing the Convention to New York will be discussed to-night at the McCallan dinner, which will be attended by ex-President Cleveland, David B. Hill, Judge Alton B. Parker, Judge Gray and other Democratic leaders of national repute.

It is said that all these Democratic leaders realize that holding the Convention here will strengthen the Democratic cause, and for that reason they are interested in it.

LOCOMOTIVE BLOWN UP, TWO KILLED, THREE HURT

PORT JERVIS, N. Y., Dec. 29.—Locomotive No. 1317 of the Erie Railroad, attached to a freight train, exploded to-day at Hankins, near here, killing two men, fatally injuring one and seriously injuring two others.

The locomotive was one of the monster type used for hauling heavy freight trains over the mountains. Ira Wallace was the engineer. He had two firemen, Frank Loven and William Kellam. Matt Carr, a track walker, was riding on the locomotive.

As the train approached the bridge over the Delaware River the engineer found that he had difficulty in making steam; he could not understand it and stopped the train to investigate. As he reached the ground after climbing from the cab the explosion occurred.

The men in the cab were blown in all directions, the track was torn up and freight cars were demolished. Frank Boyle, a trainman, standing on a car near the engine, was blown 100 feet down the track, but escaped with bruises. Carr, the trackwalker, was found in the Delaware River.

"CORBETT" AND HANLON WEIGH IN FOR FIGHT

Little Men in Superb Shape for To-Night's Battle Step on Scales Within Stipulated Weight Limit of 129 pounds Before a Select Crowd.

THOUSANDS OF DOLLARS PLACED ON CHAMPION SENDS ODDS DOWN.

Immense Crowd Arrives Early at Hayes Valley Athletic Club's Arena and Clamor for Admission, but Late Comers Can Only Buy Admission Tickets.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Dec. 29.—Just at the stroke of 6 o'clock this evening, "Young Corbett" and Eddie Hanlon weighed in for their fight to-night. The scene of the weighing-in was Harry Corbett's cafe and a select crowd of 100 invited guests witnessed the event.

"Corbett" was just inside the limit of 129, while Hanlon tipped the beam at 128 1/2 pounds. After that was over the feather-weight champion went to the Palace Hotel to rest until the time for him to go to the clubhouse and don his fighting togs. Hanlon went to the house of a friend.

It is all arranged for two boys to be in the ring at 9:30 sharp (12:30 New York time). While the boys were resting the doors of the Hayes Valley A. C., before which the boys are to fight, were besieged with men and boys anxious to witness the mill, which to their minds would be the greatest in the history of the sport here. Every seat was sold out early and the late comers had to be content with admissions.

The betting grew brisk as the time for the fight drew nearer and at the ringside the early occupants of the seats were offering 2 to 1 on the champion. At those odds they found many takers and it was certain that by the time the boys shook hands a big fortune would depend on the result. Besides the big bunch of New York money sent with which to back "Corbett," the local race-track men are speculating on the champion's chances retaining his title.

All day both little men rested quietly at their headquarters. Neither did any work and both expressed confidence of carrying off the victory.
