

WEALTHY WOMAN STRANGELY MISSING

Mrs. Alta Stodols Denham, Recently Released from Bloomingdale Asylum, Disappears, and Sister Advertises for Her.

MIXED TO AVOID HUSBAND.

Her Presence Desired in Order that a Final Accounting of Her Father's Estate May Be Made—Fears People Are After Her Money.

INFORMATION wanted of the whereabouts of Mrs. Alta Stodols Denham, who was recently liberated from Bloomingdale Asylum.

The above advertisement, which appears in a daily paper, calls attention to another chapter in the romantic and somewhat sensational career of Mrs. Alta Stodols Denham.

Her presence is desired now by her sister in order that a final accounting of the estate of George E. Stodols, her father, may be made.

Mrs. Denham is one of the three daughters of George E. Stodols by his second wife, Mary Sawyer Stodols, who had been his housekeeper.

Not long after her marriage Mrs. Denham disappeared from her apartments in the Rialton Bldg. Her furniture disappeared also.

Just about a year ago her wanderings came to an end when she was committed to Bloomingdale, a victim of morphia, on a order by Judge Scott of the Supreme Court.

It is said that because she is wealthy she fears there are people who are anxious to get her money.

STABBED, BUT DID NOT FEEL ANY PAIN

Conductor McCarthy, of Broadway Line, Badly Wounded in Fight with Negro, Who Was Beaten Off with Controller.

Although Conductor Edward McCarthy, of the Broadway line, was stabbed to the bone in his right leg in a fight with Frank Robinson, a negro, at Canal street early to-day, he did not feel the pain, and was not aware he was hurt until he felt his shoe full of blood half an hour after reaching the car barns, at Seventh avenue and Fifth street.

The fight was a bitter one. The negro boarded the car several blocks below Canal street and refused to pay his fare, it is charged. The motorman was called back to help put him off the car, but Robinson showed fight, and he was badly beaten with the controlling bar before he was thrown to the street.

Recovering himself he leaped to the rear steps and made a lunge at the conductor and then jumped to the street again. McCarthy thought the negro had struck him with his flat cap and paid no attention to it.

An ambulance was called from Roosevelt hospital and the police found McCarthy's wound was almost to the bone. The blood was still flowing from it and McCarthy was growing weak.

The negro's seat was badly cut and he applied at the New York Hospital for treatment. The police found him at No. 27 West Fourth street. He was in bed and in bad condition and was taken to Bellevue Hospital as a prisoner.

McCarthy's wound was cleaned and he is still very weak at the hospital.

SEVENTEEN GOATS BUTT INTO LIBERTY

Animals Were Being Taken to Jersey City by Italian Butcher, Who Intended to Convert Them into Mutton.

VICTIM OF WRECK RECEIVES \$45,000

Fredrick Wilson, Upon Whose Body 4,500 Pieces of Skin Were Grafted, Paid by Jersey Railroad Company.

PLAINFIELD, N. J., Feb. 4.—Wilson, Frederick, of Dunellen, N. J., who was injured in a wreck on the Central Railroad of New Jersey and whose life was saved by friends who gave portions of their skin which were grafted on his scalded body, has been paid \$45,000 by the railroad company as compensation for his injuries.

Fredrick's case attracted the attention of physicians all over the country. During the time he was in the hospital 4,500 pieces of skin were grafted on his body. They were taken from the arms of volunteers, who were fellow Missions. Several times his condition became such that it was thought he would die.

Fredrick was an employee of the United States Express Company, and was riding on a pass which stipulated that the railroad was to be exempt from damages in case of accident. It was contended that this stipulation would not hold in court, however, and the company settled rather than have the case come to trial. His compensation amounts to \$10 for each piece of skin grafted on him.
