

ALLEGED PLOT TO STEAL BRIDE

Keeler Declared to Have Caused Arrest of Young Husband so That He Might Have Chance to Make Love to Wife.

DAMAGE SUIT FOR \$25,000 JUST STARTED.

There Was a Check Transaction Made Basis for the Prosecution, but an Honorable Discharge Resulted.

Charging that Isaac Keeler falsely accused him of fraud and forgery and had him arrested in an effort to get him out of the way, so that he could get his pretty wife, Benjamin Zuckerman secured from Supreme Court Justice Davis an order for Keeler's arrest in a suit for \$25,000 damages.

Keeler is President of M. Server & Co., a corporation. He was arrested by Deputy Sheriff Terry to-day and admitted to bail.

Zuckerman alleges that Keeler had him arrested on a charge of forging a \$500 check of M. Server & Company, and of defrauding that concern; that the charge was false and that after spending three days and two nights in jail, he was honorably discharged by Magistrate Ommen. He declares that Keeler is prosecuting him in order to get his wife, Mary, away from him, and she corroborates him in an affidavit.

Mrs. Mary Zuckerman avers in her affidavit that she has been married to Zuckerman only ten weeks. For eight years prior to her marriage Keeler had been her suitor, and she says when he learned she was about to be married he threatened to kill himself.

After her marriage, she alleges, Keeler threatened to blacken her character before her husband if she did not lend him \$1,000. She got the money from her husband. But she alleges that in spite of this Keeler told her husband damaging statements about her.

TEACHERS DECLARE DOCTOR WAS RUDE

Vaccinating Physician from Health Department Who Visited Schools Is Charged with Intimidating Bashful Pupils.

At a meeting of the Forty-first School District Board, held in Elmhurst, L. I., last night, charges of extreme rudeness were made against a physician representing the Board of Health of Queens County.

District Superintendent Franklin made the assertion that a doctor from the Health Department had been visiting the various schools, without notice, and demanding to know who had been vaccinated.

"And he would not take the words of the pupils or of the teachers," said Mr. Franklin, "but demanded visible evidence and frequently used force. Many of the pupils and teachers are not vaccinated on the arms, but to this doctor that fact made no difference. He insisted on a display of vaccination marks before the whole school."

School Commissioner Crough said he knew this to be true, as his fourteen-year-old daughter, Mary, had come home crying, with the sleeve of her dress cut. She said that a vaccinating physician had demanded to see her vaccination mark, and when she demurred to an exposure before the class he had ripped her sleeve open with a penknife.

These statements made the members of the District School Board exceedingly angry, and they immediately filed a long complaint with the Health Department, demanding that these actions should cease at once. They demanded also that every school should be given at least two days' notice before the arrival of the vaccinating physician, and that when he came, the children should be in a private room and in the presence of a teacher when the girls are examined, and the presence of the principal when the boys are examined. In no uncertain words they demanded also that there should be no rudeness and no intimidation. Officers of the Health Department today said they had received similar individual complaints before, but they had been unable to substantiate them. The health officers said that the only vaccinating physician now employed is Dr. Arthur Thompson. They were quite certain that he would not be guilty of such rudeness as was attributed to the doctor who visited the schools. The Health Department was inclined to pass on the complaints on the theory that they grew out of the opposition of a certain coterie to the practice of vaccination.

SCANNELL'S HOUSE SAVED.

Blaze Menaced Property of Ex-Fire Commissioner in Saratoga.

(Special to The Evening World.) SARATOGA, N. Y., Feb. 9.—A Clark street building owned by ex-Fire Commissioner John J. Scannell, of New York City, and the spacious stables of George H. Bauder, proprietor of the Grand Union Hotel livery, had a narrow escape from destruction by fire early to-day.

They adjoined on either side the McFarland apartment house on Clark street, which was burned. The weather was intensely cold and the fire department was handicapped by frozen hydrants. The property destroyed is also in close proximity to the Scannell cottage, "Chateau O'Phelia."

MAN FOUND HURT ON TROLLEY TRACKS

Seen by Motorman as Car Rapidly Approached Him—Unable to Explain How He Had Been Injured.

As car No. 1000 of the Brighton Beach Railroad was running from Coney Island to Sheepshead Bay Motorman Reimer saw in the glare of the electric headlight the body of a man lying on the tracks as he was nearing West First street, Coney Island.

Together with the conductor, Thomas Fogarty, Reimer got off and picked the man up. He was still alive, but unconscious, and was bleeding from a number of wounds about the head. He was put on the car and taken to Sheepshead Bay, where an ambulance was summoned from Kings County Hospital.

It was learned that the unconscious man was Patrick McQuade, living in East Thirteenth street, near Neck Road, Sheepshead Bay. He could give no explanation of how he had been hurt, having gained consciousness only long enough to tell his name and address. Ambulance Surgeon Moses discovered a number of bruises about his body, as though he had been struck by a train and rolled along the ground. No bones were broken. He was taken to the hospital.
