

MAYOR FROWNS ON NEW HARLEM PARK

Intimates in Board of Estimate that Scattering \$2,000,000 Privileges Is Not to Be Lightly Considered.

"Do you regard a \$2,000,000 park as a small privilege?" interrupted the Mayor, as a speaking was urging the board of Estimate to establish a park in Harlem on the east side.

"Well, you live opposite a park, Mr. Mayor, and surely you must appreciate the presence of that park. We, too, want a park for our women and children on the upper east side, and we would esteem it a great privilege if the city would give us one."

"It is a \$2,000,000 privilege," said the Mayor.

"We will compromise by calling it a \$1,500,000 privilege," interrupted the speaker. "Mere trifles—half a million dollars in this age of money," commented the Mayor.

The question of establishing a park between One Hundred and Twenty-second and One Hundred and Twenty-fifth streets, bordering the East River, has been endorsed by local boards, but both Comptroller Groat and the Mayor appeared to-day to oppose the project. On motion of the Comptroller the application was laid over.

BOY KILLED BY A TRAIN.

Little Victim Hit at Street Crossing Not Identified.

A boy, about eleven years old was run down and killed by an incoming train on the Long Island Railroad at the Thompson avenue crossing, in Long Island City, to-day. William Norrie, the engineer, was arrested and arraigned before Magistrate Smith, who paroled him in the custody of the railroad authorities.

The boy, who was not identified, had light hair and blue eyes and wore knickerbockers, a jacket and laced shoes.

GLAZIER FALLS TO DEATH.

Loses Hold While Putting in Pane of Glass on Fourth Floor.

Isaac Cohn, fifty-eight years old, while putting in a pane of glass on the fourth floor of No. 35 Sutton place, to-day, fell to the sidewalk and was instantly killed. He lived at No. 210 East Fifty-sixth street.

GIRL FELL ON A RANGE.

Mary Malynski, seventeen years old, was badly burned at her home, No. 78 Jersey street, New Brighton, S. L., early to-day by tripping and falling on a range. She was taken to St. Vincent's Hospital at West Brighton.

BROKE LEG AS HE RAN INTO THIEF

Policeman, Hurrying to Aid Another Officer, Collides with Prisoner and Is Knocked Down—Removed to Hospital.

Policeman Florence Chinnery, while trying to head off an escaping thief in Jersey City early to-day, collided with the latter and fell, breaking his right leg below the knee. He was taken to the City Hospital.

The thief was caught by Policeman Entwistle. He gave his name as Bernard Burke, twenty-two years old, of No. 18 West Twenty-fifth street, New York.

Entwistle saw Burke trying to break into a fruit store on Exchange place. He ran over to the store and was about to grab Burke when the latter started to run toward Hudson street. Entwistle rapped with his club for assistance.

Policeman Chinnery heard the raps, came running around the Hudson street corner and collided with Burke. They knocked into each other so hard that both men fell. Burke got up and started to run away. Before he got very far Entwistle caught him.

Sending his prisoner to Police Headquarters, Entwistle went back to Chinnery, who said his right leg was injured. Entwistle called for the City Hospital ambulance, and Chinnery was taken there. The doctors said his leg had been broken.

Judge Higgins, in the First Criminal Court, held Burke for examination. He said he was out of work and intended to steal to get money for food.

QUEEN ISABELLA WORSE.

Royal Patient Asks to See King Alfonso, Who Is Her Grandson.

PARIS, April 8.—The condition of former Queen Isabella, of Spain, is exciting serious apprehension, owing to her advanced age and the complications. Her three daughters, the Infantas Isabella, Eulalia and Marie, are now at her bedside here.

Queen Isabella has asked to see her grandson, King Alfonso, and a telegram to that effect may be sent to him.

DUCK SHOOTING LAW STANDS.

ALBANY, April 8.—The Senate today sustained the spring duck shooting law of last year by a party vote of 26 to 21, on a motion of Senator Bailey to discharge the Porras, Fish and Game Committee from further consideration of the Hubbs bill, cutting three months from the close season on Long Island.


