

VOTE \$5,000,000 FOR SALT WATER

Aldermen Approve This Appropriation for the Construction of the High Pressure Mains for Use in Case of Fires.

WORK OF CONSTRUCTION WILL BE BEGUN AT ONCE.

The District Bounded by Twenty-third Street, Chambers Street, Bowery and North River Will First Be Benefited.

Mayor McClellan's plan for an auxiliary high-pressure salt-water supply for fire-fighting purposes is now assured. The Board of Aldermen to-day unanimously voted for the appropriation of the \$5,000,000 necessary for the installation of the system as outlined in the report of the engineers designated from the various departments.

200 SEEK MAN WHO ATTACKED CHILD

Five-Year-Old Girl Found in Semi-Conscious Condition in Open Lot Near Her Home, in Brooklyn.

Police in the Williamsburg district of Brooklyn are seeking a man who attacked five-year-old Katie Leler. Shortly after the child had been discovered in a semi-conscious condition in an open lot near her home at No. 575 Johnson avenue, 200 men started out to find the culprit. The men carried ropes and threatened to hang the man if he was found.

SIGNS PENSION FOR A BLIND POLICEMAN

Mayor McClellan Approves Measure Benefiting McKenna, Whose Eyes Were Shot Out by Jeremiah Hunter, a Negro Desperado.

Mayor McClellan to-day made Policeman McKenna happy and at the same time earned the blessing of his widowed mother—when he announced that he was prepared to sign the bill granting McKenna, who is totally blind, a pension of fourteen hundred dollars a year. McKenna's eyes were shot out in September, 1902 when he attempted to arrest Jeremiah Hunter, a negro character who had barricaded himself in a house near Bowery Bay, North Beach.

MYSTERY IN EDITORS DEATH.

St. Louis Man Dies From a Beating and Three Arrests Made. ST. LOUIS, April 12.—Charles O'Brien, editor of the "American Celt," was assaulted on the street and taken to the City Hospital in an unconscious condition. It is dead from his injuries. O'Brien was recently admitted to the City Hospital apparently suffering from an assault. He could not give an account of how his injuries were received beyond saying he had been assaulted in a saloon while talking politics.

7 CRASH IN RUINS OF WRECKED HOTEL

Triangular Slice of the Sagamore at Thirty-fifth Street and Eighth Avenue Falls Suddenly to the Sidewalk—Victims Taken to Hospital.

A triangular slice from the corner of the Sagamore Hotel, a four-story brick building at the northwest corner of Thirty-fifth street and Eighth avenue, fell into the street this afternoon, burying five workmen engaged in putting in a new sidewalk and two passersby. A man who saw the accident said that he noticed two or three women and children from the three upper floors falling with the bricks and other wreckage, and this had the effect of putting the police to extraordinary exertions in the way of rescue.

WORKED THEIR WAY OUT.

Some of the laborers were able to work their way out of the debris unaided, having sustained only slight injuries. Nicholas Varacci, one bootblack, was polishing the shoes of William McCarthy on the sidewalk on the Thirty-fifth street side of the building when the collapse occurred.

SHE HAD NARROW ESCAPE.

Less than a minute before the accident Mrs. Dora Weiss and her daughter, Carrie, left the corner room of the building on the top floor and went to the kitchen in the rear. This move undoubtedly saved their lives, as the floor and walls of the room and the roof dropped to the street.

NEW CAR MAKES TRIP IN SUBWAY

Officers and Directors of Company Go from 121st Street and Broadway to the City Hall and Return.

A score of the officers and directors of the Interborough Railway Company took a trip through the subway from One Hundred and Twenty-first street and Broadway to the City Hall and back again this afternoon, the purpose being to test one of the new cars and to locate as nearly as possible the places along the subway where the tracks are laid closer to the walls than they ought to be.

AMBULANCE HITS SERGEANT.

Knocks Down Detective John Connors, Badly Injuring Him. Detective-Sergeant John Connors, of the Eighty-second Precinct, Brooklyn, formerly attached to the City Chamberlain's office, was run down to-day at Fulton and Adams streets by an ambulance of the Long Island College Hospital. He was so seriously injured that he was taken to the same hospital.

WIFE INSANE, HE ENDED HIS LIFE

Howard Fuller, Long a Prominent Member of the Royal Arch, Morton Commandery, Shoots Himself Twice.

FOUL PLAY DISPROVED BY LETTERS HE LEFT.

Requested Brewer George Ringler to Take Charge of His Affairs and See that He Got Masonic Burial.

Howard Fuller, forty-five years old, a member of the Royal Arch, Morton Commandery, and of many years prominently identified with the Masonic fraternity, shot and killed himself at his home, No. 201 East Ninety-second street, last night. He was alone in his house. His wife is an inmate of the Manhattan Asylum at Ward Island.


