

# CAPT. J. J. HEALY UNDER ARREST

## President of Alaska Exploration Company Is Charged with Grand Larceny in Connection with Purchase of Mines.

### IN CUSTODY IN CHICAGO; WILL BE BROUGHT HERE.

### Well-Known Mining Man Is Preparing to Fight Extradition Proceedings—His Counsel Says There Is Nothing in It.

Capt. John J. Healy, the former President of the Central Alaskan Exploration Company, who has had an adventurous career as a soldier, a scout, an explorer and a seaman, has been arrested in Chicago at the request of the police on March 28 last for grand larceny, the complaint against him being Samuel E. Adair, who represents the company in this city.

The charge against Capt. Healy, who is reputed to be a millionaire, is that on Sept. 25, 1902, the Board of Directors of the Central Alaskan Exploration Company passed a resolution authorizing the withdrawal of \$2,227.17 of the company's funds from the Seventh National Bank of New York to be deposited in a bank at Seattle. President Healy, it is alleged, drew out this money, but deposited it to his own credit. The matter went undisturbed for some time, it is alleged. When Mr. Healy declined to refund the money, said Assistant District Attorney Smyth, he was arrested.

Some time ago Inspector McClusky learned that Healy was in Helena, Montana, and wired the police there to arrest him. On Saturday he received a telegram from Thomas Travis, Chief of Police of Helena, stating that Healy had gone to Chicago and was probably stopping at the Great Northern Hotel in that city. The inspector there wired Chief of Police Francis O'Neil, of that city, to arrest Healy, and yesterday received a despatch stating that Healy had been captured. Chief of Police O'Neil stated that Healy would undoubtedly start habeas corpus proceedings and requested that full information regarding the case be wired him and that an exemplified copy of the papers in the case be sent. This request has been complied with, and it is expected that as soon as the necessary formalities can be gone through with Healy will be brought back to this city for trial.

**Healy's Counsel Explains.**

Capt. Healy has retained James Hamilton Lewis in Chicago as his counsel, and Mr. Lewis issued this statement in the case today:

"Capt. Healy was the President of the Alaska Exploration Company, and as such had a right to use the company's funds. He purchased some property at Yakutat, Alaska, for \$3,000. The directors began to quarrel among themselves and declared that the property was worth only \$5,000. Under the New York law the president of a corporation can be arrested for larceny of a sum of money which represents the difference between the actual value of the property and what he paid for it."

Capt. Healy is famous as a mining man and is known as 'the discoverer of the Klondike.' His special interests are in the Yukon and came to New York and organized several enterprises, including railroads and mining exploitation companies. He is President of the North American Transportation and Trading Company. His wife divorced him last fall, naming actresses as co-respondents. While in New York he made his home at the Imperial Hotel and was reputed to be wealthy.

# HORSE RUNS AWAY ON BROOKLYN BRIDGE

## Stopped So Suddenly by a Closed Gate that the Driver and His Fare Were Hurlled to the Roadway.

Frank Rogers, of No. 42 West Fortieth street, was driving a Victoria across the bridge to-day when the reins caught under one of the shafts. The horse took fright and began to run toward Brooklyn.

Rogers tried to recover control of the horse, but could not. There were a number of trolley cars on the south side of the bridge at the time, and the runaway narrowly missed colliding with them.

Within 200 feet of the Brooklyn and Policeman Gardner saw the horse, and ran for the gate, which is used for such emergencies. He closed it just in time. The horse crashed full tilt into the gate and was pinned under it. The victoria was upset, and Rogers, the driver, and his fare, William Smith, of No. 44 West Sixty-seventh street, were heavily thrown on the board roadway. They were badly bruised and cut about the legs and suffered considerably from the shock of the accident.

Ambulance Surgeon Adams, of the Brooklyn Hospital, came and dressed their injuries. The horse was untangled, the victoria righted, and Rogers drove Smith back to Manhattan.

# SHOTS FAILED TO STOP SAFE ROBBERS

## One Was Hit in Chase, but He Got Away with Another After Cleaning Out the Passaic Post-Office.

PASSAIC, N. J., April 22.—Burglars broke into the post-office at Lodi before dawn to-day, blew open the safe and got away with \$500 in stamps and money and a number of valuable papers belonging to Postmaster James Mercer. A side door of the office leading to Arnot street was forced and the safe was drilled and loaded with nitro glycerine.

Recorder Andrew D. Ker, who lives opposite the post-office in Main street, heard the explosion and got out to investigate. When he came out of the house he saw two men coming from the office.

He fired a shot from a revolver and one of the men uttered a cry of pain as the two disappeared in the darkness. Ker aroused several of his neighbors and they gave chase, but were unable to catch the robbers. The police of all the surrounding towns were notified but no arrests have been made.
