

**ACTOR DONALDSON IS A STEIN MAKER**

"Prince of Pilsen" Singer Burns Out Two Pieces of Norway Pine for Benefit of Free Swedish Hospital.

Arthur Donaldson, who sings the title role in "The Prince of Pilsen," is not pleased that the opening of the fair in Brooklyn for the benefit of the Swedish Free Hospital coincides with the date of his appearance at the Shaftesbury Theatre, London, May 14. Mr. Donaldson was waited on by a committee of his countrymen and asked to sing on the opening of the fair. One of the committee, who knew that Donaldson was a protegee of Ibsen's, having created a number of the leading roles in his dramas, asked Donaldson to burn a couple of wooden steins to be sold for the benefit of the hospital.

When the actor was in Sweden, Ibsen taught him, among other things, the use of tools. Donaldson has been busy for the past two weeks boring out the drinking mugs and applying the needle which shows the skill of the craftsman.

The mugs stand a foot high, the turned-in background showing the long thick needles of the dark Norway pine. On the lip of each cup is the word "Skal!" Below is emblazoned the coat of arms of his country. Around the base "ravens" swing over half a dozen vases. The whole idea is one symbolic of the cold north-land.


