

## "DUTCH LOUIE'S" STRONG PLEA

Five Times Convicted of Burglary, He Told Judge Crane in Brooklyn that on This Occasion He Was Innocent.

JUDGE, UNMOVED, SENT HIM AWAY FOR 20 YEARS.

Statement of Dietrich, Who Has a Long Criminal Record—Made a Profound Impression on Others Who Heard It.

Louis Dietrich, a celebrated criminal known to the police all over the country as "Dutch Louie," was sentenced to twenty years in Sing Sing prison by Judge Crane in the County Court in Brooklyn to-day after one of the strongest appeals ever made to a judge by a confirmed criminal.

Dietrich has been in Sing Sing five times for burglary. Several weeks ago a lot of silk was stolen from a store at No. 37 Boerum place, Brooklyn, and some coats from a store at No. 49 Morell street. After the Boerum place robbery Dietrich and a man named Kalzman were found near by with the silk in their possession. Kalzman has not been tried, but Dietrich was tried and convicted in short order. He was also convicted of the Morrell street robbery, although the evidence of his guilt was not very strong.

**Prisoner's Strong Plea.**

When arraigned for sentence to-day, Dietrich looked Judge Crane squarely in the eyes and said: "Your Honor, I am an old thief and deserve no mercy. At the same time, an old thief has some rights and I want to say to you before you pass sentence on me that I am innocent of this crime. It is true that I was found with the silk in my possession, but it was handed to me less than two minutes before I was arrested by a man who passed me, and who evidently knew me, although I didn't know him. He evidently knew he was pursued. This seems improbable, but it is true. I am as innocent of the crime as you or your self. I swear before God that I did not do it, and while a man who has been convicted five times can hardly expect a jury to believe anything he says, still I tell you that I am innocent. If you take the ground that I am justly convicted, it is all up with me in this life, for I know what the habitual criminal law means. I can only look to you for mercy."

**Impressed His Hearers.**

"Dietrich," said Judge Crane, "twelve men have listened to the testimony and have pronounced you guilty. If I was disposed to believe you I should do nothing for you, as my course is clear under the law. You are an habitual criminal and as such I sentence you to twenty years at hard labor in Sing Sing. You have the right to appeal."

"I can't blame you," said Dietrich, "and I cannot blame the jury. It looked bad being found with all that stuff but before God I did not do it."

Dietrich is penniless and friendless and there isn't apt to be an appeal in his case. Despite his reputation, his statement made an impression on all who heard it.

**HELEN GOULD READY TO BUY.**

Property Left by Her Father in Irvington to Be Appraised.

**WHITE PLAINS, N. Y., May 2.**—With a view of having the value of Lyndhurst, the home of her father, the late Jay Gould, at Irvington-on-the-Hudson, and Woody Crest, where she maintains a home for crippled children, properly appraised by experts and to have deeds to the country seat, which she desires to buy, made legal, Miss Helen Miller Gould to-day secured an order from Supreme Court Justice Keogh for the appointment of William G. Davies as a referee to decide the issues involved and make his report to the court.

Miss Gould some time ago brought a friendly suit against her sister, the Countess De Castellane, and her brothers, George J. Edwin, Frank and Howard Gould, to secure possession of her father's country estate, which she wants to keep as a memorial home, and she is willing to pay \$348,847 for it. To-day all the Gould heirs filed their answers to the suit in the Westchester County Clerk's office at White Plains, and they all acquiesce and agree that Miss Gould should be allowed to purchase the estate. When Lyndhurst is sold Miss Gould will also purchase Woody Crest, her home for crippled children, for \$9,728, and other land for \$37,335.41, so that then she will own all the land of her father in Irvington, and which property she has always desired to possess.

**LYNCHONHAUN GOES FREE.**

United States Supreme Court Releases Accused Irishman.

WASHINGTON, May 2.—The United States Supreme Court to-day affirmed the decision of the United States Circuit Court releasing Thomas Walsh, alias Lynchonhan, the Irishman arrested in Indiana and for whom extradition was sought by the British authorities. Lynchonhan was charged with murder.

## MOTHER DIES OF GRIEF FOR SON

Just Before the Time Set for Funeral of Her Nine-Year-Old Boy, Mrs. Lydia Morse Suddenly Expires.

DEATH DUE TO BROKEN HEART, SAY DOCTORS.

Excessive Grief Caused Abnormal Cardiac Action—Mother and Son to Be Buried To-Morrow Side by Side.

Heart-broken over the death of her little son, Mrs. Lydia Morse, thirty-five years old, of No. 40-12 North Oxford street, Brooklyn, died to-day just a few minutes before the time set for the funeral of her nine-year-old son, Frederick, while playing ball in the street last Friday ran into a tree and injured himself badly. Melancholy set in and the lad died that night. Mrs. Morse was frantic with grief over her loss. Nothing that her husband or her friends could do for her seemed to soothe her in the least.

She was so weak on Saturday that she had to go to bed, and yesterday two doctors were called into attend her. They said that Mrs. Morse would die if she did not control her emotion.

Mrs. Morse grew worse, and to-day when her husband tried to get her to rouse herself for the funeral services she broke into a fresh torrent of grief and then fell unconscious across the bed. Physicians were summoned, but they could do nothing. The woman died in less than an hour after her collapse.

Coroner's Physician Hartung, who made an examination of the body, said that Mrs. Morse undoubtedly died of a broken heart.

"She grieved so that her heart action became abnormal," he said, "and this worked on her kidneys, which were already weak, until they were no longer able to perform their functions. It is a very remarkable case."

Dr. Hartung issued a death certificate. Shortly after the death of Mrs. Morse, friends of the family began to arrive for the funeral of her son. They were terribly shocked to hear of the fresh grief of the family.

The funeral of the boy was postponed until to-morrow when there will be a double funeral from the house. Mother and son will be buried side by side.

**GIRLS LEAP FROM WINDOWS.**

Escape in Night Dresses to Scaffold When Fire Threatens.

One of the occupants of the tenement at No. 224 East One Hundred and Seventh street fell asleep while smoking in bed about 11 o'clock this morning and started a fire. The tenants fled to the roof, to the street and to a painters' scaffold on the third story.

Four girls in their night dresses jumped out of the windows to the scaffold. Firemen cut out the trailing blaze, and the girls were taken from the scaffold.
