Enthusiastic People Line Broadway from Battery to Madison Square to View the Most Popular of Annual Parades.

CHIEF CROKER RECEIVES A TREMENDOUS OVATION.

Medal Heroes Who Saved Lives and Men Who Stopped Baltimore's Fire Prominent in the Long Procession.

Greater even than the throng that greeted the policemen on parade last Saturday was the outpouring of New Yorkers who cheered the firemen on parade to-day.

The firemen, big and strong and alert, swung along in thin blue lines between their machines, keeping better line than the policemen did.

Just before the parade started the operator at the fire box at the Battery notified Chief Croker of the two-alarm fire at One Hundred and Tenth street and Third avenue.

Operators were stationed at every fire-alarm box along Broadway. Had it become necessary to take any of the apparatus from the line on account of a fire, arrangements had been made that would have allowed it without disturbing the progress of the parade.

Baltimore Heroes in Line. Prominent in the parade were six of the companies that were sent to Baltimore and stopped the great fire that threatened to wipe out that city.

The parade was reviewed at the North monument by Mayor McClellan, Fire Commissioner Hayes and other heads of City Departments.

The Bennett medal went to Fireman James R. McEvoy, of Hook and Ladder No. 3. He is the man who went into a tenement fire at No. 237 First avenue on May 3, 1893, and carried out Fireman William McNally, who had been cut down by the flames.

McEvoy's clothing was burned from his body and he lay for weeks in the hospital. Poor McNally died and this caused McEvoy more grief than his own serious hurts.

Fireman Luke Henry, of Hook and Ladder No. 10, was given the Bonner medal for his rescue of Battalion Chief Conway from certain death.



FIRST ADDRESS SHE GAVE WAS WRONG ONE.

JERSEY FUGITIVE TAKEN IN BOSTON

Man Wanted in Connection with Killing of Harry English in Paterson Arrested in Massachusetts.

PATERSON, N. J., May 14.—Word has been received here of the arrest in Boston of Domenico De Feo, who is accused of having murdered Harry English in this city on May 2.

The arrest was made at the request of the Paterson authorities. He was captured on board the steamship Romanita, which sails to-day for Italy. He was found hidden in the forecastle of the vessel.

Detective Sergt. Tins yesterday lodged a charge of murder against De Feo before Recorder Noonberg. The coroner's jury that investigated the murder of English found that he had met his death at the hands of a person unknown to the jury.

George C. Berk had been arrested on suspicion, but he satisfied the police of his innocence and insisted that the shooting had been done by a man known to him as Dominic. This man, the police say, is De Feo. It was found that the latter had left the city and it was known that he had friends in Boston.
