27 MORE RAIDS, ROSE STARTERS RUN 1, 2, 3 IN STAKE RACE

Savable Wins Van Cortlandt Handicap by a Head from Rosetint, with Red Knight Third and Hurst Park, the Favorite, Fourth.

Racing To-Day at Westchester Below Standard of the Track—Dapple Gold, Khorasan, Oriskany, Lee Ridley and Hurstbourne Win for Their Backers.

Racing was dull at Westchester this afternoon. The races were below the standard of this course, and there was only one that had any class to it. That was the Van Cortlandt, a seven furlong dash. To this race Mr. Drake added Savable, Mr. Boston his mare Rosetint and Mr. Randolph his four-year-old Red Knight.

Previous to the addition of these horses the race looked as if it would furnish a duel between Hurst Park and Lux Casta, and when the horses were put up it was seen that Hurst Park was still the favorite, with Lux Casta the second choice. Savable, however, was the medium of a heavy play, though at their last meeting Lux Casta beat Savable half a length. Lengths, however, was a different horse to-day. Hurst Park was very slow to begin and he was last turning into the stretch. Then he began to close very strongly, but he was not able to get inside the money. Red Knight beating a nose, Damon raced to the front with Division and they ran on for six furlongs and dropped out. Hurst Park then Rosetint and Savable closed and fought it out to the end. Savable won by a nose, Rosetint beat Red Knight a length and a half for the place.

The other races were scarcely worthy of special mention. The track was fast, the weather superb and the attendance much larger than the average Monday.

Favorite Wins the First.

Though the horses in the opening event were ridden by maiden jockeys the talent picked them in the order in which they ran. Dapple Gold, the favorite, Niskayuna second and Flag Officer third choice. They ran this way from start to finish. Dapple Gold went to the front at the start and making all the other horses, he won by six lengths from Niskayuna, who was second all the way. Flag Officer was eight lengths behind.

Khorasan Lands the Second.

In the second race the talent was not so sure of their ground. Practically nothing was backed. Pink Garter was a like warm favorite, while Sportman was the same kind of a second choice. They ran this way from start to finish. Pink Garter broke in front, but he was outrun by Khorasan and Savable. These two ran in close order until the dip, when Khorasan drew away and won cleverly by a length and a half from Savable, who was second.

Oriskany Takes the Third.

Balkal and Oriskany went to the post in the third practically even favorites, with the latter being the best played of the others. Oriskany made white Balkal was not in it at any stage. Thistle Heather was the first show, but was outrun by Oriskany, who led all the rest of the route and won ridden by out of the stretch. Thistle Heather, who hung upon second place and beat Tol San to lengths for the place.

Added Starters One, Two, Three.

The addition of Savable, Red Knight and Rosetint lent additional interest to the Van Cortlandt, which was a curious coincidence that the three horses should run one, two, three. Hurst Park was the favorite, but he was backed. Lux Casta and Savable ran second choice. They went away in close order, with Damon and Division in front of Rosetint and Careless. Damon then showed the way to the stretch, where Division dropped out of the race. Savable finally winning by three lengths, Rosetint finishing fourth, and Red Knight fifth.

Good Thing in Steeplechase.

Lee Ridley, the good thing in the Steeplechase, backed from 10 to 1, made a made all the running and won easily by two lengths from Red Knight, who was second all the way. Black Death was third throughout, finishing eight lengths behind the leader. Hurstbourne won as he pleased.

Buttons made the early pace in the eighth followed by Hurstbourne and Athel. They ran this way to the stretch, where Hurstbourne moved to the front with ease and won by a head and a half from Buttons, who beat Athel six lengths for the place.

The Police Commissioner Follows Announcement of Proposed Proceedings Against Him by a More Sweeping Move Than That of Last Week.

TELEPHONES SEIZED AND MANY PRISONERS TAKEN

Five Raids in Tenderloin Precinct, Where Police Were Led by Inspectors Brooks and Walsh—Leon Stedeker Caught at No. 50 West Broadway.

Twenty-seven raids this afternoon was Commissioner McAduo's answer to ex-Assistant District Attorney Dan O'Reilly's threat to sue him for damages for false arrest in behalf of his clients, caught in the police scoop-net raids of alleged pool-rooms, and to have the Commissioner arrested as the first move in these damage suits.

Meantime District Attorney Jerome was busy explaining how it happened that his assistants were assisting in Police Court to the discharge of the prisoners captured in the raids. Mr. Jerome said:

"These raids are made without any knowledge on my part or any request for co-operation by the District-Attorney's office. It has been reported to me by my assistants that not a scintilla of evidence was obtained by the police and in order not to be made fools of, my assistants refused to ask the Magistrates to hold prisoners. I don't want but criticism, but the Dowling witness law was never intended for a purpose that could be abused. The mere sending of messages is no crime."

MAKING NEW RAIDS.

Inspectors Brooks and Walsh, with Capt. Cottrell, led raids on five places in the Tenderloin. They were at Nos. 42 East Nineteenth, 16 West Thirty-seventh, 351 Fifth avenue, 51 West Thirty-third and 118 West Thirty-first street.

Detectives McCormick and Rooney, of the Church street station, raided a room on the second floor of No. 20 Dey street and arrested the alleged proprietor, who was said to be Percy Levine, and gave that name and said he was twenty-eight years old and the place raided was his house. Two telephones and a speaking tube through a partition wall were torn from their fastenings and taken to the station.

Simultaneously Detective-Sergis. Landrigan and Maloney raided an alleged pool-room at No. 65 West Broadway. As at No. 20 Dey street, two men were found playing cards. One arrest was made. He said he was Leon Stedeker, fifty years old, speculator and living at No. 314 East Fifty-second street.

Landrigan had spent three hours in this place, and says that in that time the telephone rang six times and that only two men were present. Their telephone was seized.

Stedeker is now under conviction of maintaining a gambling-house.

RAILS IN MANY SECTIONS.

The raids extended from the Church street to the West Forty-seventh street stations. Some of the most important ones, in addition to those mentioned, were in or near the downtown financial districts. In all, ninety-four telephones were seized and fourteen prisoners taken. At No. 112 Fulton street twenty 'phones were seized and four men caught. There were nine 'phones in operation in a room at No. 132 Nassau street. Up at No.
