NEW PRISONERS NOT IDENTIFIED BY KIDNAPPED BOY

Young Mannino Confronting a Woman and Two Men, Occupants of the Harlem Tenement Where He Is Supposed to Have Been Held a Captive, Says He Never Saw Them.

MYSTERIOUS VISITOR TELLS POLICE A DEAL WAS MADE.

When three prisoners who were arrested at No. 214 East One Hundred and Sixth street this afternoon by Detective Carro, of the Amity street station, in Brooklyn, on suspicion of being the kidnapers of Antonio Mannino were confronted with the boy later in the day, Mannino looked them over carefully and then declared that he had never seen them in his life.

Contractor's Wife Declares the Lad Was Grieved Away by Conspirators, Who Later Made an Agreement with Boy's Father to Return the Captive for \$500—Money Was Sent, but Person to Receive It Was Not Seen.

The prisoners were Francesco Bella, his wife, Clementina, and the boarder, Alfredo Horn. Bella and Horn are shirtmakers, and were arrested at their place of employment, No. 627 Broadway.

DEATH IN TORNADO TOWN CUT SWATH IN ST. LOUIS.

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 18.—A high wind, approaching a tornado in violence, swept over a limited area in North St. Louis this afternoon, killing two, possibly three, persons and injuring about fifty.

Two Persons Known to Have Been About Fifty Injured and Buildings in Track of Gale Wrecked.
