KILLED HIS BROTHER, BEATEN FROM CORPSE

West Side Man, Maddened by Jealousy, Strikes Down His Victim with Bottle, Stabs Him Twenty Times, Then Clutches Throat of Dead Man to Make His Murderous Work Sure by Choking.

Wife of the Murderer Over Whom He Quarrelled Declares There Was No Ground for Suspicion—Dead Man a Bachelor, Was Business Partner of His Brother, and Had Boarded With Him for Years.

In a fit of furious anger over the alleged attentions of his brother to his young wife, Antonio Barbone, fifty-four years old, of No. 253 West Forty-seventh street, murdered his brother Fred, this afternoon.

He struck the younger man over the head with a bottle, and as he staggered toward the wall, the slayer became a maniac. He grabbed a huge carving knife and plunged it into his victim's body, pulling it out and plunging it in again twenty times before his blood lust was satisfied.

Then, for fear the last breath of life had not gone out of the man, he leaped upon the body and grasping the throat in his hands, squeezed with all his strength. He was still choking the dead man and uttering the most horrible imprecations, when the police arrived on the scene.

ACCUSED HIS BROTHER. Barbone has a wife and nine children. Although he is fifty-four years old, his wife is only twenty-four and rather pretty. Fred Barbone was thirty-four years old, and, unlike his brother, was lively and fond of dress and pleasure.

ORDERED FROM HOUSE. At breakfast to-day Barbone was very ugly. He went away on a job, however, and did not return until noon.

CLUTCHED DEAD MAN'S THROAT. The screams of Mrs. Barbone and the children brought Policeman Knipfer to the house. He broke into the apartment and found the murderer clutching the throat of his dead brother.

MURPHY BEATS M'CARREN IN HIS WAR FOR CONTROL

Senator Victor J. Dowling, Appointed by State Committee to Take Charge of Campaign in Greater New York, Sidetracks the Brooklyn Leader and Puts the Tammany Chief in Control of Local Situation.

COMPROMISE MADE AT MEETING WITH NATIONAL COMMITTEEMEN.

Wigwam Men Jubilant, Say McCarren Now Holds the Empty Honor of Executive Chairman, and that it Will Be All Murphy Across the River—Formal Announcement by Cord Meyer.

It developed late to-day that the purpose of the conference between Charles F. Murphy and Chairman Taggart, of the National Democratic Committee, to-day had for its object the placing of Senator Victor J. Dowling on the State Executive Committee, with the express duty of practicing taking charge of the organization in Greater New York during the coming campaign.

EMPTY HONORS FOR M'CARREN. Mr. W. S. Rodie was recently assigned in charge of the Bureau of Organization created by the committee and the appointment of Senator Dowling means that he will perform similar service in Greater New York, with a due regard to the existence of County Committees therein, and to organize within that territory for the purpose of assisting in polling the entire Democratic vote for the Democratic ticket.

MURPHY THE MASTER. At the conference by which this was effected were present several members of the National Committee, Chairman Cord Meyer, of the State Committee; Senator Victor Dowling, Charles F. Murphy and Chairman Taggart, of the National Committee. A candidate of Leader Murphy to-day:

"This move means that McCarren will be permitted to hold the position of Chairman, while he will have nothing to do with the organization in Greater New York. Murphy will be complete master of the situation, as he is now. Through Dowling he will direct and McCarren will have to follow.
