SON OF JUDGE GRAY MARRIED SECRETLY TO GIRL HE LOVED

When Engagement of Young Auston Gray to Alice Burnham, of Boston, Was Recently Announced Parents Interposed and Match Was Broken Off.

THEY WERE WED YESTERDAY AND WILL GO TO EUROPE

Two Other Sons of the Judge of New York State Court of Appeals Accompanied the Elopers to Providence and Were Present at the Wedding.

Setting parental objection at defiance, Auston Gray, the twenty-three-year-old son of Judge John Clinton Gray, of the New York Court of Appeals, has eloped with Miss Alice M. Burnham, the beautiful daughter of William A. Burnham, a retired capitalist, of Beacon street, Boston.

Young Mr. Gray and his bride are in this city, getting ready to start for Europe, in spite of the parental veto, combined as it is with the dignity of the Court of Appeals bench.

Mr. Gray and Miss Burnham were married yesterday morning at Providence, R. I., by Rev. Frederick William Smith, assistant pastor of Green Church, in that city. The young man was attended by his two brothers, one of whom, John Clinton, Jr., is a banker at 200 Broadway. A small company of intimate friends from Boston and New York witnessed the ceremony. Mr. and Mrs. Gray came direct to New York on the first news of the wedding leaked out of the little coterie having knowledge of it at the Casino in Newport to-day.

Auston Gray is a graduate of Harvard in the class of 1903. He is a member of the Zeta Psi fraternity, an athlete, a companion since infancy of the younger Vanderbilt boys and one of the most popular men in society. Since he was a child he has spent his summers at the magnificent country home of his parents at Newport.

BRIDE AS CHILDHOOD PLAYMATE. His bride was his playmate in childhood and the families have always been on the friendliest terms. Mr. Gray has frequently visited at the country home of the Burnhams at Pride's Crossing, near Boston, and has been a guest at the Burnham town house as well. The present Mrs. Auston Gray was a bridesmaid at the marriage of her husband's sister.

When Auston Gray got his degree from Harvard he determined to become a banker and broker, and his choice met the approval of his father. He went into the brokerage business in this city and prepared to make an exhaustive and scientific study of banking methods in this country abroad.

Close application to business during the winter and dulness in the street when summer came on made the budding banker long for the home and enjoyments of Newport, and to Newport he went. There he met the lovely Miss Burnham and the fires of love that had been dormant in his heart for years blazed up.

Miss Burnham returned his affection. They had known each other long that little time was lost in reaching an understanding. In the spring the young people became engaged, but no announcement of the engagement was made, for reasons that appeared wise to the contracting parties.

DEVOTION WAS APPARENT. Their devotion to each other at Newport was so apparent as the summer progressed that the secret could no longer be kept, and on July 26 the engagement was formally announced at Newport. The young man expected opposition from his side of the house, but believed that he could break it down.

Judge Gray objected—not to Miss Burnham—but to a marriage at this time. He said that his son was too young, that marriage would interfere with his studies and have a deterring effect upon his career. So strongly were the objections made that it was announced a week ago that the engagement had been broken off.

This was more than Auston Gray had bargained for, but he was not entirely discouraged. He wired down to New York for his brothers and as soon as they could get away they joined him at Newport. They approved of his choice and promised their assistance.

The bridal party went from Newport to Providence on the first train yesterday morning. It was an unearthly hour, and none of the members of the fashionable colony was astray. The absence of Auston Gray and Miss Burnham was not noticed until the regular morning gathering at the Casino to-day, and then the story came out.

Mr. Gray and his wife are in retirement in New York and could not be found to-day. John Clinton Gray, Jr., said that they would sail to Europe within a few hours on an extended wedding trip, and while in Europe young Mr. Gray will make investigations of banking methods, even though he does so as a Benedict.
