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NEW "L" CONFERENCE ENDS, BUT DANGER OF STRIKE IS NOT OVER

Another Meeting Is Held at the Home of August Belmont Without an Agreement with the Representatives of the Employees Being Reached.

Tie-Up May Be Prevented by a Strong Rivalry Between the Organizations Controlling the Men Who Work on the Steam and Electric Roads.

The differences between the employees of the L and the Interborough Rapid Transit Company were not definitely settled at the conference between the labor leaders and the Interborough representatives at the home of August Belmont, No. 44 East Thirty-fourth street, to-day.

ANOTHER CONFERENCE TO-NIGHT.

There will be a conference to-night between General Manager Bryan, of the Interborough, and W. D. Mahon, in whose hands rests the interests of the "L" employees not identified with either the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers or the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen.

There were present at the meeting this afternoon Mr. Belmont, General Manager E. P. Bryan and General Superintendent Frank Hedley, of the Interborough; Warren S. Stone, Grand Chief of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers; W. D. Mahon, International President of the Amalgamated Association of Street and Electric Railway Employees of America; Charles Wilson, Deputy Grand Master of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen, and delegates from the employee's unions.

The conference was arranged at a meeting of the labor leaders held this morning in Horton Hall in One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street. A communication signed by Mr. Stone, Mr. Mahon and Mr. Wilson was sent to Mr. Belmont asking him to appoint a time and place of meeting.

Mr. Mahon is opposed to a strike. He will go to any length to prevent it, even to the extent of calling to New York Samuel Compers, President of the American Federation of Labor, the man whose word goes further in trades unionism than that of any other.

FIGHT BETWEEN UNIONS

There is a fight on between the unions of steam railroad employees and the Amalgamated Association. The steam railroad unions, in the order of their importance, are the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen, the Order of Railway Trainmen, the Order of Railway Conductors and the Order of Railway Telegraphers.

POLO GROUNDS, Sept. 3.--The Giants celebrated their return home by taking a game from the Boston this afternoon with a pitched-up team. Taylor and Willis were the opposing pitchers and did good work, but Taylor was the best and had the better support.

It was like going home for Christmas this coming of the Giants to-day. The family--that is, about five thousand of it, was on hand early to welcome back the victorious New Yorkers. As each individual member of the Giants trotted out on the field from the clubhouse he was given a cheer of recognition and a round of applause.

McGraw and Billy Dahlen, at present laid up for talking back to an unemphatic umpire in Cincinnati, were recognized as they took seats in the grand stand and given their share.

Mathewson was the last of the Giants to appear on the field and he got, except in the case of McGraw, the greatest reception. Bowerman, too, was given a big "hand," and his whipping of a Cincinnati rooter was referred to and approved of. When Luther Taylor walked out the crowd broke loose first by cheering, but later stood up and waved hats and handkerchiefs, so that the deaf pitcher might better understand what was going on.

McGraw's reception amounted to an ovation. Three times three cheers, with a corresponding number of tigers, were given, and then every one settled down to see the Giants win from the Boston.

At home, failed to show up in time for the game and McGraw put Bowerman on first. Dunn was at short and Doolin in centre. McGraw also had Catcher Marshall, loaned to Boston some months ago, in a New York uniform and ready for work. Taylor showed up best in the preliminary work and he finally was picked to pitch.

\$200,000 IS LOST ON ORT WELLS, FAVORITE IN CENTURY STAKES

Drake's Colt, Heavily Backed in Rich Feature at Sheepshead Bay, Is Beaten Only by a Nose by Stalwart, Who Breaks Track Record.

DRAKE-GATES COMBINATION ALONE BETS \$50,000 ON RACE.

Tradition, Hot Choice in Flatbush Stakes for Two-Year-Olds, Wins Easily--Madden Makes Killing on Waterside, Which Easily Beats Lady Amelia.

SHEEPSHEAD BAY, Sept. 3.--The defeat of Ort Wells in the Century Stakes was the stunning surprise. There was Sheepshead this afternoon. There was no excuse for Ort Wells. He was perfectly ridden. He was in the pink of good condition, and the winner, Stalwart, had to establish a new record--2:11 1/2--to beat the crack three-year-old.

No one looked for as much improvement in Stalwart. He has been running in sprint races, but his last race at Saratoga, when he ran Delhi a good race opened the eyes of his trainer to the fact that his taste was distance and not sprinting. He had not started since Saratoga and was especially prepared for this race to-day.

Redfern rode Stalwart in beautiful style. He rated Stalwart in behind Ort Wells all the way, never making a move until near the stretch. There he closed on Ort Wells, and a drive followed that will be remembered by all who saw it. Stalwart got his nose in front, and though O'Neil urged Ort Wells with desperate energy, he could not overcome that slight lead, and they went away by the judges with Stalwart's nose about six inches in front of Ort Wells.

It is estimated that at least \$200,000 was bet on Ort Wells, and of that sum at least \$50,000 was wagered by Messrs. Drake and Gates. They regarded Ort Wells as a sure winner and did not hesitate to plunge.

Mr. Thomas also backed Stalwart well and is said to have won \$25,000 on the race outside of the sum about in the amount of \$10,000 to the winner.

Justly won the Flatbush Stakes yesterday, but he was not in the front at the start and the field safe all the way. The surprise was that he won the race. Lady Amelia was a good third, down from 3 to 1 to 10 to 1. Lady Amelia was of bad, but she rushed right through the field and showed the race to the stretch, followed by Waterside, being backed from 2 to 1 to 10 to 1.

See Gull made the early pace in the Steeplechase, followed by the Ragged Cavalier and Deliverty. They led the race for a mile when Deliverty took the front, and staying there to the end won easily by six lengths from Deliverty, who finished strong, and Gull and the Ragged Cavalier tried to a walk.

Waterside Ten lengths in French. Lady Amelia was regarded as peculiarly a sure thing in the second race for the run home, but he could not beat Deliverty, who was backed from 2 to 1 to 10 to 1.

Tradition was a red hot favorite in the Flatbush Stakes and St. Belina was thrown out by the local owners, being heavily backed and then Burnt Hills had backing and Glenn was played after his price touched 10 to 1. A little could be seen of the race, they were near the bend. Then Deliverty was seen to be in front with Tradition, St. Belina and Glenn close on him. Tradition was the best Tradition drove away and turned into the straight, far of the others. Ocean took second place, followed by Tradition, who was the favorite. Tradition extended herself, who wins easily by a scant length from Ocean, who was a length in front of St. Belina.

Stalwart Won Ort Wells a Week. Ort Wells went to the post on odds-on favorite. He had been backed from ever money to 1 to 2 to win a fortune. He was out. Abby to Tenney. Willis was backed to win. He was well backed. Delhi went away in his usual fashion and made the running, followed by Ort Wells, Stalwart and Short Horse. They ran in this order around the first turn, and when they were near the bend, Ort Wells was in front. It was apparent that Ort Wells could pass Delhi at any time, for he was only backing.

On the turn a dirt pass Delhi and then Ort Wells was seen to be in front. It was seen that Stalwart was going over easily. As soon as they were into the stretch, Stalwart closed on Ort Wells and then began a grand drive.
