Newton Bennington is waiting to add the scalp of Ort Wells to the belt of Beldame. Beldame is engaged in the September Stakes, at a mile and three furlongs, to be run on Wednesday.

It would be the race of the year. It is up to the hustling secretary at Brighton to provide a special race where Beldame could meet the winner of the Annual Champion, or if Brighton is too close, then let Gravesend arrange the meeting.

Beldame and Ort Wells would make a cracking good race of it at a mile and three furlongs. Both have a world of speed, and there is no question about the route. It is a pity Beldame is not in the Annual Champion, for there would then be a quartet of the crack three-year-olds of the season.

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Possibilities Enormous. The possibilities of racing are enormous. A crack two-year-old might sweep through a season and earn a man more than enough to keep him for life.

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BIG CROWD SAW NELSON WIN BOUT

(Special to The Evening World.) BUTTE, Mont., Sept. 4.—The fight between Aurelio Herrera and "Batting" Nelson before the Butte Athletic Club went the limit of scheduled twenty rounds, and Referee Dunc McDonald gave Nelson the decision.

It was the gamest fight seen in Butte in a long time, and was give-and-take during the last nineteen rounds. There was but one knockdown, scored by Herrera in the fourth, and Nelson drew first blood in the eighth.

Only once or twice during the fight did Herrera use his famous crouch. Nelson landed three times to Herrera's once, but his blows lacked steam behind the blows of the Mexican. Nelson weighed 130 and Herrera 124½ pounds.
