

WOULD NOT DROP PALMIERI SUIT

Woman Suing City Court Judge Not in Court, but Justice Roesch Insisted On an Adjournment Until Oct. 11.

CHARGES IN AFFIDAVIT MADE BY ATTORNEY.

Was Engaged, Then Dropped by Mrs. Bonaccio in Apparent Effort to Have the Case Settled Quietly.

The case of Mrs. Julia Bonaccio against Justice John Palmieri, of the City Court, for the recovery of interest and instalments on a peculiar note alleged to have been executed by the defendant in favor of the plaintiff four years ago, was not tried to-day before Justice Roesch, nor was the action dismissed, as the attorney for Justice Palmieri would have it. Instead it was set for Oct. 11, when the strange phases the matter has assumed may be explained.

Attorney S. Wechsler, whose brother is a law partner of Palmieri, appeared for the defendant to-day, but not until after court had adjourned did any one from the other side appear. Neither Justice Palmieri nor Mrs. Bonaccio was present. On file, however, in court, was a long affidavit made by Attorney William B. Dobbs, of No. 167 Broadway, counsel of record for the woman.

Dobbs Dropped as Attorney. This affidavit purported to recite Dobbs' preparation of the case for Wechsler, his efforts to secure Albert C. Carroll, a Hoboken attorney, as a witness and the surprising fact that the plaintiff had calmly dropped him from the matter and substituted in his place as attorney one George E. Messinger of this city, who it appeared from a copy of a letter had been employed by Carroll. The stipulation also was made that the stipulation had been entered into between Messner and Wechsler to withdraw the case from court. A move to dismiss the action because of the non-appearance of the plaintiff, announced Attorney S. Wechsler to-day.

"You do," remarked the Court sarcastically, "in view of the affidavit which has been filed here I shall do nothing of the kind. The attorney of record for the plaintiff has made serious charges in this matter affecting the professional reputation of a brother attorney, and out of courtesy to him and courtesy to the man accused I think they should have an opportunity to be heard. The case is set again for Oct. 11."

"Then I insist," said Wechsler, "that the record shall be that I moved for a dismissal because of the non-appearance of the plaintiff, and when asked what you don't mean to say that you with a record of that kind?" asked Justice Roesch in surprise.

"Well, you may have it then," Attorney Dobbs got to court a moment after adjournment and when asked what he proposed to do and if he had anything to say said that the record of the

case spoke for itself. Justice Roesch declined to make any comment. The suit grows out of a note for \$4,000 alleged to have been made Nov. 16, 1901, and said to be due Dec. 1, 1903, which Mrs. Bonaccio claims was made payable to her by Justice Palmieri in compromise of an alleged sentimental episode in their lives. The action is to recover the interest on the note.

GERMAN DAY AT THE FAIR.

Big Through Celebrates the Landing of the Tentons in America. ST. LOUIS, Mo., Oct. 6.—Displaying white ribbons bearing the inscription "Do your duty to the old country and the new," Germans from all parts of America assembled on the World's Fair grounds to-day to celebrate German Day in connection with the landing of the first Germans on American soil, on Oct. 6, 1683.

The German-American National Federation, comprising all German-American societies, was well represented, as was the national German singing societies, with its membership of 200 different organizations, and the National Association of the Veterans of the German Army and Navy. The principal exercises of the day were held on the Plaza of St. Louis, comprising exhibitions in calisthenics and gymnastics by local Turners and children's classes, some 2,000 of the latter appearing in massed exercises. At the conclusion all joined in singing the hymns of the fatherland, and concluded with "Star-Spangled Banner."

ZEMSTVOS WITH MIRSKY.

Russia's New Minister of Interior Assured of Their Support. ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 6.—The Zemstvos throughout Russia are acclaiming the programme enunciated by Prince Sviatopolk-Mirsky, the new Minister of the interior. Among the many telegrams he has received is the following from the Zemstvo of Nishni Novgorod:

"The Zemstvo greets Your Highness in the firm conviction that the programme proclaimed by you will convince the people of your good will and that they may impose implicit trust in your attitude toward communal institutions and the extension of their sphere of usefulness. The Zemstvos will insure the peaceful movement of Russia along the road of progress."

SENATOR TO OPEN THE FAIR.
