

### GUZZLED A POUND OF DEADLY BOOZE

It Was the East Side Brand, Which Retail at Three Cents a Glass, and Schnodman, the Drinker, Is in Hospital.

### DOCTORS SAY HE IS IN DANGEROUS CONDITION.

Foolish Man Had Been Challenged, and He Drank Eighteen Glasses of the Stuff Poured into a Vessel.

Eighteen glasses of whiskey gulped down all at once on a wager that he could "beat away with it" is the reason doctors at Bellevue Hospital wouldn't give a snap of their fingers today for the life of Abe Schnodman, a tall, who lives at No. 102 Suffolk street, and who works in a shop at No. 67 Greene street. And such whiskey! Malrose Davis, of No. 169 Stanton street, a fellow workman of Schnodman, who saw him drink the liquor, and who was with him when he collapsed in the street, says it is sold around the tailoring shops in the factory district for three cents a glass.

**Scarcely a Pound of Booze.**  
A glass of the size that was shown to a reporter of The Evening World to-day, as a measure of the quantity taken by Schnodman holds about an ounce of whiskey. A conservative estimate of the quantity drunk by Schnodman brings it near to fifteen ounces.

Schnodman's wager as to his "carrying capacity" was made with Harry Imovitch, of No. 17 Orchard street, who has a sewing machine in the Greene street shop. When the fruit peddler, who carries a bottle of "schnaps" hidden away in the bottom of his basket, got in an appearance last evening Schnodman proposed that if he drank all that the men had Imovitch would pay him the same amount that he paid the peddler.

**Of Course He Didn't Feel Well.**  
Schnodman measured out eighteen glasses into a pitcher and got the liquor down all right and was apparently in good condition for half an hour afterward. Imovitch paid the bet and then Schnodman said he didn't feel well. He started for home in Davis's company and had gone half a block when he collapsed.

A prominent toxicologist said to-day that the amount of the berry liquor that Schnodman had taken was enough to kill any one.

"Whiskey that sells for three cents a glass," said the scientist, "never saw the word of a distillery. It is made of wood alcohol, prune juice, tobacco juice, perhaps a little sax vomica and some coloring matter. Imagine twelve or fifteen ounces of that stuff striking your stomach undiluted all at once! Just let your imagination run as far as you like. Any result will fit the case."

**BIG SCHOONER BURNED.**  
ROCKLAND, Me., Oct. 7.—The three-masted schooner James R. Talbot, loaded with 2,000 casks of lime for New York, was burned near Rockland Breakwater to-day. The schooner was owned by Washburn Bros., of Thomaston. Both cargo and schooner were insured. The Talbot was built at East Machias, Me., in 1874, was of 302 gross tonnage and 116 feet long.

### SCHOOLGIRL ENDS STRIKE OF PUPILS

Seventy-five of the eighty boy and girl scholars of Public School No. 136, Fourth avenue and Forty-second street, Brooklyn, who struck because they were transferred to School No. 52, at Fourth avenue and Thirty-sixth street, were persuaded by a very pretty little miss to obey their teachers to-day.

Principal Dewey, of School No. 136, which is called the "Palace" by Brooklyn schoolmen, resorted to strategy to break up the strike. He called little Miss Lillian Tobin, of No. 47 Forty-fourth street, up before him and pleaded with her to lecture her fellow-strikers on the foolishness of their positions. He argued so softly and persuasively that she became his champion.

It took the bright eyes and ready tongue of Miss Tobin only a very few minutes to convince her companions that they should abandon the strike and consent to the transfer to School No. 52, even if it was called the "Coal Bin." There were five, however, who stoutly declined to be beguiled by the pretty little schoolgirl and led by Chas. De Hart, of No. 46 Forty-first street, they assert that they will never sit in a "Coal Bin" class-room.
