HALL BY SUICIDE STOPS HIS TRIAL IN CLUB SCANDAL

Fear that the District-Attorney Might Act On the Evidence Which Forced the Suit for Scandal, the Accused Man Shot Himself in the Head in His Lodgings To-Day.

"ONLY COURSE LEFT TO HIM," SAYS ONE OF THE WITNESSES.

Revelations of a Sensational Character to Have Been Made at the Trial—Affidavits Ready to Prove Truth of the Charges on Which He Had Based His Slander Suit.

Knowledge that District-Attorney Jerome had detailed an assistant to look into the charges upon which F. de Peyster Hall based his \$50,000 slander suits against officers of the Calumet and New York Yacht Clubs drove Hall to suicide to-day.

There is a rumor current in club circles that Hall had been accused by a woman to whom he was devoted. The scandal that grew out of the charges is said to have caused the arrangement.

The suicide of the once prominent clubman came at a time when the men he had accused of slander were making an endeavor to prove that the alleged slanderous statements charged to them were true.

Assistant District-Attorney Corrigan was in the court room to hear the testimony and prepare a report to his superior on the advisability of taking the charges against Hall to the Grand Jury.

Francis L. Wellman, who was to appear for Mr. Staples in the trial scheduled for to-day, said in court after the news of the suicide reached him: "It was necessary to fight these suits, not so much for the money involved as the reputation of the clubs which Mr. Hall attempted to blacken."

Mr. Ridgway stood firm on his affidavits. He said: "As late as Friday afternoon the World's Fair has been so heavy that all roads recently have been sending out many of their trains in two or more sections."
