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OKU'S ARMY HOLDS RUSSIANS IN CHECK

Death Struggle Now in Its Fourth Day Marked by Murderous Charges Under Terrific Fire, but St. Petersburg Reports It a Drawn Battle.

Despatches from Tokio Assert that Gen. Oku Alone Has Taken Twenty-five Guns and that Gen. Kuropatkin Has Ordered a Retreat.

ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 13.—There is no confirmation here of the rumor from Tokio that the Japanese army has captured thirty field pieces since the battle at the Yentai mines began four days ago, but there are reports of hand-to-hand struggles, charges and counter-charges that make the story of the engagement one of extreme interest.

The Japanese assumed the offensive yesterday against the Russian right, forcing the latter to give ground. But, along the centre, stretching from Yentai station eastward, where Gen. Nodzu also attempted a desperate counter-attack, and where the fighting was hottest, the Russians held their ground. The result at nightfall was a draw, but to-day the Japanese again took the offensive, and the fighting is still going on.

Despatches sent the night of Oct. 11 from the headquarters of Gen. Bliedring, whose corps occupies the Russian centre, describe the bloody and desperate character of the fight along the railroad north of Yentai station, where on Monday the Russians repeatedly charged the Japanese trenches at the point of the bayonet, the fight continuing into the night.

The Japanese reserved their fire until the Russians, at the double, were almost upon them. An instance is given of a regiment getting within a few yards of the Japanese trenches, then coming on again with reinforcements, literally under a shower of shrapnel, and finally succeeding in driving out the Japanese. But the Japanese artillery fire was so withering that the Russians were unable to remain in the trench.

TOKIO, Oct. 13.—According to despatches from the front the Japanese have gained many advantages in the battle in Manchuria which has now been in progress for four days.

Gen. Oku has captured twenty-five Russian guns, making a total of about thirty Russian guns which have fallen into the hands of the Japanese since the battle began.



\$100,000 TAKEN OUT OF RUG BY VICTORY OF A 100 TO 1 SHOT

Lady Henrietta; One of the Best Things of the Racing Season, Lands Race Galloping After Being Backed Off the Boards by Arthur Featherstone and His Friends.

OFF IN FRONT, TRAVERS RODE HARD TO THE END,

Filly New to Bookmakers and Railbirds, No One Knowing What She Could Do but Those Who Bet on Her and Profited So Handsomely.

The sensation at the Westchester race track this afternoon was the victory of Lady Henrietta in the race for two-year-old maidens. Lady Henrietta is the property of Alfred Featherstone. She started only once before, but was unplaced. In the betting to-day Lady Henrietta opened at 100 to 1. She was steadily backed in small amounts all over the ring as the price kept dropping; by ten o'clock there was only 15 to 1 on offer.

She went to the front at the start, and the air was resounding with the cries of delighted backers. When she swept by the finish a dozen hats flew into the air, and the long-shot player hugged one another in a frenzy of delight. It is estimated that \$100,000 was taken out of the ring in the victory of this filly. The time of the race equaled the record held by Christina A.

Outcome Won the Stake. Out came the Hamango Handicap very cleverly. While Minnie, Ostrich and Ormonds' Right were out forcing the pace with one another Outcome laid in behind and began breathing to the front in the last furlong and won by a length in very handy fashion. Minnie was an easy second. Wotan was the favorite and he ran a fair race for a mile.

The opening event went to Sals, who came to life in the soft going. Fronta, the 6 to 5 favorite, ran a poor race. It is said, however, that she has never been partial to mud. Libretto II won the steepchase from Pure Pepper. The track was heavy, weather cold and attendance good.

Sals an Easy Winner. Fronta was the favorite in the opening event with Greencrest second choice. Fronta, Greencrest and Sals ran in close order to the stretch where Sals went to the front and won easily by six lengths from Stolen Moments which closed with a rush and named Greencrest on the post.

Libretto II First in Jump. Libretto II was the favorite in the second race, and he won. Jim Slick raced to the front and opened up a gap of fifteen lengths, which he held for about two miles. Libretto II, lying second and Pure Pepper third. In the last half Libretto II closed, and Jim Slick tiring badly fell at the jump nearest the Withers course. Libretto II then came on and won easily by three lengths from Pure Pepper, who beat Henry, who rode Jim Slick, had a bad fall.

Lady Henrietta a Good Thing. Campo was the favorite, with Fox the second choice and Ranger the third choice. The real drama of the race was, however, the race between Fox and Campo, who were backed off the boards at the start, made all the running and won in a big gallop by six lengths from Campo, the favorite, who beat Libretto II for the second. Lady Henrietta started only once before and had shown no form. It is estimated that \$100,000 was taken out of the ring on this victory.

Outcome's Good Race. Wotan was the favorite in the Hamango Handicap, Ormonds' Right and Ostrich were well backed. Wotan raced away in front, and was not once joined by Minnie, who was backed together to the far turn, where Ostrich, who had been backed off the boards, joined them. They raced in close order to the stretch, where Ormonds' Right, who was backed off the boards, apparently an open race at the furlong pole, where Outcome suddenly raced to the front, and stayed there, winning easily by a length. Minnie was a length and a half in front of Ormonds' Right.

High Chancellor in Front. Dick Bernard made the running to the stretch with Major Daingerfield and High Chancellor near. In the run home Dick Bernard quit, and High Chancellor came away, winning by a length from the Major, who beat Africander eight lengths.

Jimmy Lane All the Way. Arsenal was a hot favorite in the last race, but he had no speed. Jimmy Lane made nearly all the running, and won easily by two lengths from Arsenal, who beat Morokanta a head.

Mrs. Asher Fisher had her Child in Her Arms When a Can of Kerosene Exploded, Enveloping Them.

Mrs. Asher Fisher and her seven-month-old baby were fatally burned in their home, on the fifth floor of No. 210 East One Hundred and Second street, this afternoon, through the explosion of a can of kerosene with which the mother was endeavoring to light a stove.

Both mother and child were unconscious when placed in the ambulance. All of the woman's hair had been burned off. The ambulance left the fire in a few minutes but the fat was put out in a few minutes by firemen.

WEINSEIMER'S DEFENSE BEGUN

Contractor Who Accuses "Diamond Phil" of Extorting \$2,700 from Him Says His Life Has Been Threatened.

The defense of "Diamond Phil" Weinseimer was outlined this afternoon by his counsel, George Raines. He will attempt to show that the charges of extortion against Weinseimer were trumped up by the Building Trades Employers' Association for the effect they would have upon the building trades strike and lockout.

Mr. Raines told the jury that the association of employers, with \$20,000,000 back of it, went deliberately into a scheme to ruin Weinseimer, the leader of the strike. This he said he hoped to show by witnesses.

At the end of his address the case was adjourned until tomorrow, when testimony for the defense will be heard. Detectives on Guard.

Detectives are guarding and shadowing George Essig, the master plumber, upon whose complaint "Diamond Phil" Weinseimer was indicted for extortion. Essig has received letters threatening his life and asserts that soon after the indictment of Weinseimer he was assaulted by friends of the deposed labor leader.

Several letters received by Essig yesterday were of such a nature that he determined to seek protection. He went to District Attorney Jerome and asked for a bodyguard.

Mr. Jerome detailed two of his detectives, Reardon and Shea, to accompany Essig to his home and bring him back to court in the morning. There were a number of Central Office men in the court-room to-day looking out for the men who assaulted Essig and also for the writers of the anonymous letters.

Visit on Day of Arrest. When Judge Newburger opened court Lawyer George Raines, after a conference with the defendant, continued his cross-examination of Essig.

TOOK POISON TO EVADE EVICTION

Mrs. Catherine Walsh Received Notice that She Was to Be Dispossessed and Ended Her Life with Paris Green.

Mrs. Catherine Walsh, sixty years old, of No. 738 Second avenue, worried by a notice of eviction and the inability of being placed in a home, omitted suicide to-day by swallowing arsenic green. She died while Dr. Parr of Bellevue Hospital, was working on her.

Mrs. Walsh lived on the top floor of the rear of the house. The landlord, Mrs. Margaret White, notified Mrs. Walsh that C. B. Wilkinson, the land lord, had ordered her eviction, because the woman had been living in the house for about two years, but was two months in arrears for rent. Her husband died about nine years ago. She was a Civil War veteran, and Mrs. Walsh lived on a pension and by rent in a furnished room. She had a son, a bankrupt, but this became a haunted recently.

A week ago the land lord gave Mrs. Walsh a week's notice to leave the house. Since then relatives have been making arrangements to send her to the City Home or some other charitable institution. These things preyed on the woman's mind.

Mrs. N. Hogan to-day found Mrs. Walsh unconscious on the bed, with traces of the paris green about her.

TRIED TO BURN HIS WIFE. WILKESBARRE, Pa., Oct. 13.—David H. Barton, of Russell Hill, who tries to burn the house in which his wife lives, was sentenced to ten years in jail for a crime which he committed in 1901. He pleaded guilty and was each given 10 years in the Eastern Penitentiary.
