I WOULD GIVE MY LIFE TO HAVE HIM ALIVE! SHE CRIES

DIDN'T SEE REVOLVER UNTIL AFTER THE SHOT WAS FIRED.

Bookmaker Had Urged Her to Follow Him to Europe—He Grabbed the Actress and During the Struggle She Heard the Report of the Pistol.

In silence so intense that the creaking of trucks on the icy pavement could be heard by those in the crowded room, Nan Patterson told this afternoon her version of the death of Caesar Young.

"Tell this jury, Nan," said Mr. Levy, "did you or did you not shoot Caesar Young?"
