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## SHOT IN HOTEL IMPERIAL, AND DIES OF WOUND

### J. R. Wright, Rich Mine-Owner, Was in Room With Dr. Pardee.

## PHYSICIAN IS HELD.

### Wounded Man Makes Statement that He Fired Revolver Himself.

Major Jacob Ridgeway Wright, a wealthy mine owner, whose home is in Wilkesbarre, Pa., was mysteriously shot through the side in his room in the Imperial Hotel early today. He died in the New York Hospital within a few hours after sustaining his wound. Major Wright was addicted to the use of morphine and had been without the drug forty-eight hours at the time of the shooting.

With Major Wright when he was shot was Dr. Howard Pardee, of No. 2 East Forty-seventh street, the medical director of the United States Life Insurance Company, and one of the best-known physicians in this city. Dr. Pardee says that Major Wright shot himself just as he was leaving him after a night of constant attendance.

Dr. Weston, Coroner's Physician, who performed an autopsy, said this evening it was almost impossible that Mr. Wright could have shot himself intentionally or by accident. He said the case demanded a rigid investigation. He called up Capt. Cottrell by phone and told him the case. Capt. Cottrell said he would double his force of detectives investigating the case.

### Accident, He Said.

Before he died Major Wright made a statement to Coroner Scholer confirming the story of the shooting told by Dr. Pardee, but declaring that the shooting was an accident and that he had not tried to kill himself.

Magistrate Crane paroled Dr. Pardee on his own recognizance in the Jefferson Market Court, but later, when Coroner Scholer heard of Major Wright's death he ordered his arrest. The arrest was a purely formal proceeding. Dr. Pardee was taken to the Coroner's office and held in \$500 bail, furnished by Dr. John P. Munn.

### Died Under the Knife.

After making this statement Major Wright lapsed into unconsciousness, and the physicians decided to perform an operation. They administered ether and removed the bullet. Dr. L. A. Stimson, performing the operation, Major Wright died within a few minutes.

The physicians who examined the wound in Major Wright's side were puzzled as to how a man shooting himself or being accidentally shot could have inflicted a wound in such a place. The bullet entered the left side about two inches above the hip and passed in a straight line to the right side, stopping about an inch from the surface. The shot must have been fired with the revolver in the left hand and the weapon must have been held perfectly straight. Coroner Scholer, who also examined the wound, said that it was a most astonishing wound for a self-inflicted one.

### Dr. Pardee's Affidavit.

Before leaving the Coroner's office Dr. Pardee made the following affidavit:

"I knew the deceased for four or five years and for the past three months I had been treating him for a nervous trouble. I had been in the habit of spending about five evenings a week with him and went to him last night at 10:30 o'clock. He said he was feeling very miserable and wanted me to remain over night with him. I said I would do so. He then fell asleep and slept through most of the night.

"When I started to go early to-day, he was shot and fell and went to the bureau. He said he had something he wanted to show me. I stood at the foot of the bed reading a newspaper and wasn't even watching him. Suddenly I heard a shot and saw that he had shot himself in the side. I quickly placed him in bed and summoned assistance, and I am informed that New York Hospital Dr. Pardee died there.

"Dr. Pardee is the medical director of the United States Life Insurance Company. His wife and family do not live in New York at present. His home on East Forty-seventh street is a boarding-house. Dr. Pardee's closest friend is Dr. J. P. Munn, the President of the company, and he was in court with the physician when he was arrested.

## RIOT RULE IN CZAR'S CAPITAL AND PERIL NEAR

### Thousands of Strikers Swell Their Ranks by Violence.

## BREAK INTO PLACES.

### Close Government Works and Compel Factory Hands to Submit.

ST. PETERSBURG, Jan. 20.—A detachment of the Moscow Regiment was called out this afternoon owing to the threatening attitude of 500 strikers at Shapoval's tobacco factory. The employees of the factory decided to join in the strike movement, but the military did not intervene and returned to their barracks. The factory was closed. The crowd then proceeded to a book-binding establishment, where the employees also joined in the movement. The strikers are freely making threats of violence. The police present do not interfere, but in any case they would not be capable of controlling the agitation in the proportions it has now attained.

Troopars held in readiness at various points for any emergencies.

Over 100,000 on Strike.

The strike situation is extremely bad. The strikers are parading the city and closing shops. Over a hundred thousand are now out.

Reports from the interior are to the effect that efforts are being made to induce workmen in other cities to join and make the strike general throughout Russia.

The managers of the big concerns here have formally decided to refuse to treat with any persons except their own workmen, but they are ready to adjust all the points in dispute except the eight-hour day, which they say is a matter for the Government to decide, as a legal workday in Russia is eleven hours, allowing committees of workmen to fix the pace of piece work and the payment of the men while striking.

There is a general fear, however, that the strike has entered a political phase and that turbulence and bloodshed are inevitable.

At the meetings to-day the men were greatly excited and drew up a formal petition to the Emperor which will be sent to Tzarvsko Belo to-night by a deputation, asking him to give a response at the Winter Palace on Sunday.

This petition bitterly complains of the desperate condition of the workers and their "deprivation of human rights." The petition expresses devotion to the Emperor and concludes: "Be merciful to us. Let us live. If thou leavest us in this position we prefer to die."

### Headed by Priest.

The strike priest, Father Gopon, is going from assembly to assembly addressing the workmen.

It has been decided to hold a great mass-meeting from all quarters of the city in the palace square at 2 P. M. Sunday, Jan. 22, disregarding any opposition on the part of the authorities, even by armed force. The strikers have agreed to attend the meeting unarmed; say they are not willing to meet violence with violence and declare they wish the Emperor would see them and hear their petition.

Buter Gopon has undertaken to head the procession in clerical garb and carrying a cross.

The strikers say they are ready to die in front of the palace, but insist on being heard by the Emperor himself.

They will at the same time guarantee him immunity from personal violence. The printing establishments are closing and the newspapers may be forced to suspend publication. The greatest danger is in a shut down of the electric light plant, which would throw the city into darkness, when a reign of terror might ensue.

### GRANT TO COACH DETROIT.


