



In a letter which George Considine received from "Young Corbett" yesterday, the little fighter says that he weighs now only 135 pounds, five pounds above the mark at which he is slated to fight Nelson. Corbett further states that as he will have over three weeks in which to take off the five pounds he ought to enter the ring stronger than he ever did before.
