

Boston Symphony Orchestra in Pleasing Programme

Mr. Gericke Displays His Band's Chief Virtues at Carnegie Hall—Miss Marie Nichols, Soloist.

Mr. Gericke's programme for the fourth concert of the Boston Symphony Orchestra at Carnegie Hall last night was a treat. While it included no one of the few universally accepted masterpieces, it avoided all problems in music and relied for success solely upon the inherent beauty of the works presented. That it was appreciated the judicious applause of the audience made manifest. And it was a great audience of music lovers that heard it, despite the rival attraction in another house of stars of the first magnitude in opera combined for one occasion only in a high-priced vaudeville performance.

Cesar Franck's melodious symphony in D minor, with which the concert was begun, set a high mark of achievement. All the virtues of the band were at once in evidence—the splendid tone and precision and sonority and modulation; and, more than all, the new elasticity in Mr. Gericke which moved him to magnetic interpretation. Perhaps the last was more noticeable in his reading later of Richard Strauss's tone poem "Don Juan," which impresses the more with each hearing. A novelty was Goldmark's overture "In Italy," full of color and not without fascination.

Miss Marie Nichols, a stranger in New York, of an attractive presence, was the soloist. She played a violin concerto by Bruch that is unfamiliar. The work is not impressive, and Miss Nichols, who has much technical skill and a good, if feminine, tone, seemed to interpret it dryly and with no great depth of appreciation.

He said he feared the grandmother of the children, who lives in Sweden, had furnished them with money to pay their passage to that country and requested that the outgoing steamer be watched. Mr. Florman was seen at his home to-day. He said that the children were not at home, and when asked why the order for their search had been rescinded at the request of their mother, he replied:
