POLICE GUARD CHURCH FROM THE NIHILISTS

Woman Gives Warning to Russian Pastor Here of Plot to Destroy Edifice.

SANDS A SAMPLE BOMB.

With It is a Letterhead of Jap Consulate Found, She Says, in the Same Room.

BUT IT MAY ALL BE A JOKE.

No Chance, However, is Taken, and Church is Watched Closely— Detectives on Case.

Commissioner McAdoo revealed additional facts to-day concerning the letter received by Rev. Alexander Hotovitsky, pastor of the Russian Church of St. Nicholas, in East Ninety-seventh street, warning him of a Nihilist plot to blow up the church.

Detectives were sent to the Consulate, where they saw M. Nagai, the Vice-Consul. The letter stated that the letter-head was found in a room in which the plotters have been meeting.

How Warning Came. The warning was delivered to Rev. Hotovitsky yesterday by a messenger boy, who said it was given to him by a man on the street.

Commissioner McAdoo refused to make public the full text of the letter, which she says is quite lengthy. It is written in a feminine hand and the writer describes herself as a gentleman.

Overheard the Plot. From snatches of conversation heard by the writer, she says she gathered that they had planned to strike a blow at Russia here in New York.

The next day, the letter writer says, she entered the room in which the men had been meeting and found there several pieces of pipe, such as she sent to the minister, and the charred letter-head of the Japanese Consulate.

FOUND IN STATEROOM.

Had Registered as George Haskins, but Letters and Cards Disclosed His Identity.

CHEERFUL BEFORE SUICIDE.

Man's Home Was at New Bedford, Mass., and He Had Been Travelling in New England.

The body of Lemuel B. Burrell, of New Bedford, Mass., was found in stateroom No. 74 of the Sound steamer Chester W. Chapin when she reached this port from New London to-day.

Burrell had shot himself in the head. His identity was disclosed by letters and cards found in his pockets. Although he was registered on the boat as George Haskins, of New London, he went aboard at that place last night. Before killing himself he wrote a note on a leaf torn from a memorandum book and pinned it to his berth.

POSTOFFICE PORTER ILL WITH SMALL-POX
