One woman was killed and two others injured by Hook and Ladder Truck No. 14 late this afternoon at Fifth avenue and One Hundred and Sixteenth street. As the truck was crossing One Hundred and Sixteenth street a baker's wagon was about to turn the corner. The driver of the truck in an effort to avoid a collision turned to the right. A shaft of the truck struck a hydrant. The truck was turned over, striking three women. One was instantly killed and the other two seriously injured. The names of the women could not be learned.

SECRETARY HAY COLLAPSES AS HE SAILS TO EUROPE

Secretary of State Hay Departs Suddenly for the Mediterranean on White Star Ship Cretic, So Weak He Has to Be Almost Carried Up Gangplank.

MAY LEAVE THE CABINET UNLESS HEALTH RETURNS.

Efforts to Maintain Secrecy as to His Condition—Plans Six Weeks' Trip, but May Remain Abroad Longer—Suffering from Overwork in Washington.

SECRETARY HAY IMPROVING, SHIP SIGNALS EVENING WORLD.

"How is Secretary Hay?" This question was specially directed to the liner Cretic for The Evening World as she passed Sandy Hook this afternoon for Europe.

John Hay, Secretary of State, collapsed on the White Star line pier shortly before noon to-day as he was going aboard the steamship Cretic for a Mediterranean trip. He called on the Cretic, nevertheless, a very sick man, the necessity being imperative of his seeking a long rest at once.

The itinerary of the Secretary of State calls for a trip lasting six weeks, but it may be extended. If his health is not improved by his vacation it is considered probable that he will be compelled to retire from the Cabinet. But if he shows even a trace of improvement, it is said, he will remain at the head of the Department of State.

WENT TO SON-IN-LAW'S HOME. Upon Mr. Hay's arrival in New York from Washington yesterday evening he went to the home of his son-in-law, James W. Wadsworth, Jr.

DOCTOR SAYS REST WILL SOON REPAIR MR. HAY.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 18.—Surgeon-General Rixey, who has been attending Mr. Hay for more than a year, said this afternoon that he is suffering from nervous exhaustion resulting from overwork. He does not think there is any serious organic trouble other than that naturally expected in a man of Mr. Hay's age.
