This bit of repartee, flashed across the teacups one day last week, illustrates concisely the coming and going of the fashionable woman's gown and all of its attending details.

The return of the box-plaited skirt is hailed with delight by the average woman; aye, and by the exceptional woman. It appears looking very fit, dress length, but devoid of even the suggestion of a train. High-bust basques are here again and promise a lengthy sojourn. Medium-sized sleeves, puffed or slightly draped, are the correct mode for this season.

Tailor-made jackets are less severe. A fancy-colored vest lightens the effect. Small and drooping revers, turn-over cuffs and narrow belts are seen on tailored suits.

This season's designs of fancy waists are many, but varied. The most exquisitely draped and trimmed modes in bewildering color schemes appear before us like the first spring blooms.

In the matter of material everything will be worn. Venetian cloth, Panama cloth, broadcloth, and in the lighter fabrics all grades and weaves of silks, challies, dimity, lawn, linen (especially grass linen, which will have a great wave of popularity), made with and without colored lining.

House dresses and lounging robes have been given a great deal of attention by the fashion modellers this spring. They have displayed great ingenuity in the manner in which they have secured, by means of two or three seams, graceful, free-falling effects, and the colors in which these models are made up are very refful.

The nursery has not been neglected. Little boys' blouse and knickerbocker suits, and freedom garments, in all grades and forms, are provided for.

The little girl, too, has been thought over considerably. Everything, from pique to the finest weave of lawn, is moulded into form for the little Miss Dainty.

Black silk and natural pongee have offered themselves as sacrifices to the shrine of juvenile fashion. White pique and duck, however, will be greatly used for outing wear.

### Suit for the Small Boy.

FOR town or country this little suit is admirably adapted. It may be of serge, chevot, flannel, mohair, linen, oxford or other washable material. It is shown in old-blue linen and has an emblem marked on the shield. The pattern consists of knickerbockers and a plaited blouse with a removable shield. ### Girls' Afternoon Frock.

THE illustration shows a pretty frock for a little girl. It may be finished with round neck and short puffed sleeves, or with high neck and sleeves in full length—the pattern providing for two styles of sleeves. The skirt, which is straight and full, is joined to the waist and the bertha forms an attractive feature to the mode. IN the spring and summer fashions the small boy is not forgotten, and the models destined for his comfort are many and varied. There is none, however, more popular or more favored than the blouse suits like the one in the drawing, consisting of a blouse and the regulation knickerbockers. With this suit any style of linen collar may be worn and any style of belt. It is trim and jaunty and in one of the new linens would be extremely smart.

### Ladies' Toilet.

ONE of the new foulard silks makes this dressy frock and the yoke is of embroidered muslin. The waist is full and bloused at the front. The closing is made at the back and the choice is given of sleeves in full or elbow length. The skirt is cut with many gores and is in round length; it is closely fitted over the hips and has a generous flare at the hem. The design is suitable to many materials. The waist, Evening World Pattern No. 3,608-A, is in sizes 32 to 40 inches bust. The medium size will require 2 1/2 yards of goods 42 inches wide and 1 1/4 yards of all-over. The skirt, Evening World Pattern No. 3,607-A, is in sizes 22 to 30 inches waist. The medium size requires 5 yards of goods 42 inches wide. Either of these patterns, 10 cents. The two, 20 cents. ### Ladies' Shirt-Waist Suit.

THE skirt to this suit is shaped with seven gores laid in box plaits, and the choice is given of round or walking length. The waist is laid in tucks and shows the regulation shirt sleeve. The design may be reproduced in any soft silk or woolen or in wash goods, and little or no trimming is required to make it effective. For everyday serviceable wear no better model can be recommended. In the present instance pongee in its natural color is selected for developing and flax-color lace is used for trimming.

The waist, Evening World Pattern No. 3,690-A, is in sizes 32 to 42 inches bust. The medium size will require 2 1/2 yards of goods 42 inches wide. The skirt, Evening World Pattern No. 3,546-A, is in sizes 22 to 30 inches waist. The medium size requires 6 yards of goods 42 inches wide. Either of these patterns, 10 cents. The two, 20 cents. ### Ladies' Toilet.

MANY of the newest separate waists are made of all-over lace and are worn with skirts of plain material like the one here pictured, which combines two patterns. The waist closes at the back and may be made with high or low neck and with long or short sleeves. The skirt has seven gores and is full over the hips and at the back. The waist, Evening World Pattern No. 3,641-A, is in sizes 32 to 40 inches bust. The medium size will require 2 1/2 yards 42 inches wide and 1 1/4 yards of all-over. The skirt, Evening World Pattern No. 3,368-A, is in sizes 22 to 30 inches waist. The medium size requires 5 yards 42 inches wide. Either pattern, 10 cents. The two, 20 cents.

### Ladies' Wrapper.

THE neat housewife with light duties to perform will appreciate the virtues of this model. The back and front of the garment show becoming fulness and the sides are closely adjusted. The sleeve is a simple model, and the design is suitable to washable and unwashable fabrics. It is illustrated in black and white challies with yoke and collar of all-over.
