

"WALL STREET" LAST WORDS OF RUINED MAN

Speculator Young Decided "To Die or Not" While He Rode in a Cab. LEFT CABBY HIS FARE. He Could Not Bear to Face Family Nor Friends After He Knew of His Losses. WIFE WAS WATCHING FOR HIM

Christian Young, Jr., a speculator in stocks, shot and killed himself in a cab in the residence section of Mount Vernon, his home, last night. When a policeman who had heard the shot opened the door Young was breathing.

"Why did you shoot yourself?" asked the policeman. "Wall street," whispered the dying man. This was his last utterance. The cab was driven to Mount Vernon Hospital, but the man was dead when it reached there. As the body was removed a dollar bill, a 50-cent piece and a slip of paper fell from the seat of the cab to the floor. Scribbled on the paper were the words: "The cabman's fare."

Young was a big, fine-looking man. He lived in a cozy house at No. 23 South Terrace avenue, Mount Vernon, with his wife and ten-year-old daughter. Although a speculator by profession he was an intensely religious man, a regular attendant at the Mount Vernon Lutheran Church, and an intimate friend of the pastor, Rev. Emil Burg.

He took dinner at the home of Mr. Foye last Sunday with Ernest Sobel, who lived next door to him. After the meal Young and Sobel walked home together they talked of the market and Young said that unless there was a change it was all up with him.

He left his home at the usual hour yesterday morning. His wife asked him what time he would be home. He replied that if he did not get back in the afternoon he would be very late. Evidently the early slump in the market wiped him out, for he left his office early and was not seen again in Wall street. Mr. Sobel says that he believes Young had a total cost him about \$20,000—all he had.

In addition to losing his own money in Wall street, Young, it was reported to-day, used trust funds and lost them. He was trustee of the estate of T. B. Graham and had an account in some \$500 for the estate in the Fifth Avenue Trust Company. This account is overdrawn. He would soon have been called upon to make an accounting of his trusteeship.

Feared to Face Loved Ones. As a rule Young arrived home early in the day, before the great number of commuters filled the train, but yesterday, it is said, he did not go home. He was seen by a few friends at the Grand Central station early in the evening, but he did not take a train, so far as is known, until long after night-fall.

It is supposed now he remained in New York debating whether he had better go home, face his wife and child and tell them that he was ruined, or end it all in New York. It is likely, however, for his family evidently outweighed his determination to kill himself, and he took a train for home. He was at 22 o'clock when he arrived there, and again the resolution to kill himself that he had conceived while struggling for the mastery of the man.

Persons about the station knew him and he did not wish to drive them. As the street where he might have gone, at 22 o'clock, he thought it over, but he was not to drive home. It was in this unsettled mental condition when he called Louis Levine, a cabman, and ordered him to drive him. "Just drive anywhere," he said. "I want to meet a friend on the 11 o'clock train." Drive around, keep driving, Levine drove. He drove through Chester Hill with its pretty houses and through the section where Young lived. He drove past the house of Young, where there was a light in the hallway and another in the front room upstairs when the wife sat waiting for her husband and wondering what had detained him.

"BURY PAUL JONES HERE," ASKS NEW YORK LEGISLATURE

State Assembly Indorses and Emphasizes Evening World's Request that Body of Hero Shall Rest in the City He Loved So Well. ADOPTED UNANIMOUSLY ON MR. ELLIS'S MOTION.

New York's Representatives in Congress Asked to Use Their Influence with the Federal Government to Have New York Named as the Last Resting Place.

(Special to The Evening World.) ALBANY, N. Y., May 2.—Assemblyman William J. Ellis, of Manhattan, last night offered a resolution which was adopted by a rising vote without a dissenting voice.

It was as follows: "Whereas, The United States Government has succeeded in locating the remains of that eminent sailor and American patriot, John Paul Jones, in the Republic of France, and through the co-operation and courtesy of the French Government is bringing his body to the shores of his adopted land for final and fitting interment; and

"Whereas, The people of the city of New York believe that the most appropriate place for this illustrious hero should be on Manhattan Island, the great sailor and patriot having frequently expressed the desire to live and finally rest there; Therefore, be it

"Resolved, That the Legislature of the State of New York hereby earnestly request its representatives in Congress from this State to use their influence with the Federal Government to have the wishes of the great sailor and patriot to be buried in the city of New York carried out with appropriate and solemn ceremony.

"Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be transmitted to all members of Congress representing the State of New York."

In presenting the resolution Mr. Ellis said: "Mr. Speaker—The resolution embodies the sentiment and desire of the people of the city of New York to have the body of this most illustrious patriot buried in the city he loved so well. There is great competition among several cities for the honor of offering a last resting place for the remains of John Paul Jones. That great patriot loved New York, and frequently expressed a desire to spend his days there. I move a rising vote on this resolution."

IRISH-AMERICANS JOIN IN PLAN TO HONOR JONES.

"The Evening World's suggestion that the body of Joan Paul Jones be brought to New York for burial will receive hearty and active support from Irishmen and Irish-Americans in this city," said John D. Crammins to-day. "As President-General of the American-Irish Historical Society," continued Mr. Crammins, "I earnestly indorse the suggestion and I will personally bring the matter before our society. We will pass resolutions and will in every other possible way endeavor to have the hero's body interred in New York. "I also have the honor of being a member of the Art Commission, together with J. P. Morgan, John Bigelow, Professor, the sculptor; Mr. Farragut, son of the Commodore, and many other representative New Yorkers. This question is most likely to come before our commission sooner or later, and I think I am justified in saying all its members approve the plan. Mr. Morgan is President of the commission, and I am sure the suggestion will appeal favorably to him as well as to

Child Hunted by Scores Since Saturday Goes to Uncle in Harlem.

Eva Anderson, the precocious miss of ten, who left her home at Concord, S. I., on Saturday afternoon, and for whom her parents, friends and the police have hunted ever since, has been found. Shortly before midnight last night she rang the bell of her uncle's house at No. 305 West One Hundred and Eighteenth street. The uncle, Jesse D. Anderson, went to the door and there stood a very forlorn little figure. "I want to see my papa again," she wailed.

"Gracious me, if it isn't Eva!" said the astonished Anderson, and he grabbed the child and took her inside in a hurry. The little girl broke down and cried bitterly. She was on the verge of hysterics, and for a long time it was impossible for Anderson to get a word out of her. Anderson dressed and told the child he was going to take her back home. She refused absolutely to go, and was so emphatic about it that he uncle thought it better to wait until to-day. So without asking the child any more questions he put her to bed. The youngster was in a little better frame of mind to-day, but she still persisted in her refusal to go home, although she said she wanted to see her father. Anderson questioned her closely and the child said she had left home because of some trouble she had had with her stepmother. The child didn't want to talk about this, but said she had made up her mind to leave home for good and go to her aunt, who resides at No. 175 Jefferson avenue, Brooklyn.

BIG HOTEL HANDBOOK MAN HELD BY MAGISTRATE CRANE

John Nelson Is Said to Have Runners at All the Well-Known Places on Upper West Side. John Nelson, fifty years of age, of No. 158 West Thirtieth street, whom the police say is Doc Krizek, alleged handbook man, who takes bets from guests at all the big hotels uptown, was arraigned to-day before Magistrate Crane, in West Side Court, charged with running a handbook. He was arrested in the Orleans Cafe, Columbus avenue and West Eighth street, by Detectives Lester and Spence, of the West Sixty-eighth Street Station. According to the detectives Nelson, who runs bets out at all the hotels in the neighborhood, including the Endicott, the Mafestic, Healy's and others, and these men solicit bets from him. When arrested \$268 in cash and a record of thirty bets was found on him. He was held in \$1,000 for examination. Detectives Ray, of the West Thirty-seventh Street Station, and Edward Miller, of No. 311 Van Siclen avenue, Brooklyn, whom he arrested yesterday, are also conducting the handbook in Comerford's saloon at No. 480 Eighth avenue. Ray testified that he bet \$5 on a horse named "Dreamland," who also ran. Magistrate Crane held Miller for examination.

BOARD OF ALDERMEN HAS POWER TO RAISE SALARIES.

So Decides Justice Leventritt in Action of George W. Stokes of Charities Department. The power of the Board of Aldermen to increase salaries of city officials was declared by Justice Leventritt to-day, in a decision in the action of George W. Stokes, whose salary, while he was examiner of dependent children in the Department of Charities, was increased by resolution of the Board of Aldermen in December, 1903, from \$1,000 a year to \$1,200 a year. Commissioner Tulley, of the Department of Charities, refused to certify his salary at the increased rate to the Controller, and Stokes sued for a mandamus to compel him to do so. Justice Leventritt grants the mandamus, declaring that the Board of Aldermen has sole power to increase salaries under the new charter, which took that authority from the heads of departments. The decision affects thirty-five officers of the Charity Department whose salaries were increased at the same time on the recommendation of Commissioner Folk.
