

BARKING DOG SAVES MANY FROM FIRE. Rouses Tenants of Burning Williamsburg Tenement-House Just in Time.

KEPT RUNNING TO DOOR. Helpless Fat Woman Caught in Doorway and Couldn't Be Budged.

HOSE PLAYED ABOUT HER. Several Inmates Overcome by Smoke and Carried Down Ladders Unconscious.

A dozen persons were overcome today in a fire at No. 65 South Second street, Williamsburg, and were rescued by firemen, who made a hard fight to reach them through halls filled with smoke.

On the second floor, where lived John McCartney, his wife, their eleven-year-old daughter, his father and mother-in-law and two younger children, was a fox terrier, "Dandy." The dog scented smoke before any of the tenants and set up a barking all the time running to the hall door. McCartney thought that some one had knocked at the door and moved down the hallway of the flat to open it. Then he realized that the place was afire.
