# INVALID WOMAN HANGS HERSELF.

## Daughter Returns Home from Shopping and Finds Aged Mother's Body Suspended from Transom of Door.

Dependent over her inability to make any progress against a nervous malady that has afflicted her for many years, Mrs. Hilda Kohn, sixty years old, of No. 306 West One Hundred and Twenty-first street, ended her life to-day by hanging herself.

Mrs. Kohn had been a widow for many years and lived with her son, George, and her daughter, Bella. For the past two weeks she has been confined to her bed, and her daughter has rarely been from her side.

Returning home Miss Kohn discovered the body of her mother suspended from a rope attached to the transom of a door leading from the dining-room to the kitchen. An ambulance surgeon, who was called in, said the woman had been dead several hours.
