

DOCTOR CAUGHT BURGLAR

Big and Strong and Full of Fight the Physician Held Him Until the Police Came

Unarmed and alone, Dr. John P. Henry, a physician with an office at No. 29 West Forty-eighth street, captured a negro burglar who had entered his house to-day and held him until the police came. The negro is a big, husky fellow, twenty-four years old, while the doctor is twice that age, but still something of an athlete. The burglar was unarmed. He had entered the apartments of Frank H. Little, a travelling salesman, who is now out of the city with his family, and had stolen about \$200 worth of property, including a gold watch, a fraternity badge and other small articles of jewelry, a silver match box and a collection of foreign coins.

In the station house, after a grueling "hard degree," the prisoner said he was Walter Williamson, of No. 310 West Fortieth street, and that he had committed other burglaries, particularly in Brooklyn. Four bunches of skeleton keys were found upon him, including one of unusual appearance, shaped like a button-hook, which, the prisoner admitted, would open many locks.

Dr. Henry, who is in his office on the first floor talking with a patient when the burglar entered the house. The doctor heard nothing of the intruder until he saw the doctor's office boy, Eugene Kelly, going up to the third floor on an errand, saw a strange negro leaving the Little apartment.

"Help! Police!" "Thief!" the doctor dashed downstairs. The burglar brought the doctor out into the hall in a moment, to meet the negro leaping down the stairs four steps at a time. Dr. Henry stopped him as he took the last step to the bottom, and the burglar rolled over together.

The doctor was on top and when the negro tried to rise he held him prisoner against the wall. Kelly had meanwhile run out to find a policeman and was back in a few minutes with Patrolman Curran of the West Forty-seventh street station. Curran handcuffed the negro and took him to the station. Dr. Henry's patient, who witnessed the struggle and capture, was much disturbed.

BAREFOOTED MAN SAID HE LIVED IN HADES.

Stood in Front of Hotel and Amused Passersby—Taken to Hospital.

A man about forty years old was creating amusement to-day for passersby at Twenty-fifth street and Lexington avenue, in front of the Van Twiller Hotel. He was barefooted and bareheaded, but otherwise rather well dressed.

A patrolman of the East Twenty-second street station, went up to him and asked his name, but the man couldn't answer.

"How old are you?" asked the patrolman.

"Thirteen," was the sober reply.

"Where do you live?"

"I live in hell," was his answer to this question.

The man then explained that he had been making a "sojourn" in that place. He said he had been at Luna Park, and from there next to Hades. Later he gave an address on East Fourteenth street as his abode.

The man was taken to the Psychopathic Ward at the Bellevue Hospital to be examined as to his sanity.

POLICEMAN ACCUSES BEATEN MAN OF ASSAULTING HIM.

Gerhardt Turns the Tables on Complainant—Capt. Handy to Explain.

Harry Smith, twenty years of age, who alleges that on the morning of Decoration Day he was brutally clubbed by Patrolman Walter Gerhardt, of the

Union Market station, when sleeping in Hamilton Park, was to-day held in \$500 bail for trial by Magistrate Cornell, in the Essex Market Court, on a charge of felonious assault, made against him by Gerhardt. As the result of the slugging he is alleged to have received Smith's head and face are still done up in bandages. There are cleavages in his hair and his jaw is broken. For six days he was in Bellevue Hospital, two of them unconscious. When the case first became known in court last Monday Gerhardt admitted that he struck Smith in the law because the latter tore his trousers, Capt. Marin Handy, of the Union Market station, has been ordered by Police Commissioner McAdoo to make a report to him about the case, and also explain why it was suppressed for several days.
